Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



I am pleased to announce that we have two new councillors, who will bring the Parish Council back up to full strength:

Many of you will already know Christine Howell, as she has worked tirelessly for the village over many years, and is a previous recipient of Villager of the Year. Also joining is Craig Forster, who is relatively new to Avening, having moved here from Tetbury in 2015. Craig is keen to use his medical/clinical background and experience of fund raising for the benefit of the community.

I took on the role of Snow Warden when Jim passed away. Looking back at the two snow events in December, what did I learn:

- The grit spreader (located at the hall, and available to everyone) is by far the most effective and efficient way to clear our local roads.
- A lot of people got involved in helping to clear the snow!
- Using barrows and shovels wastes far too much grit – parts of Point Road resembled a beach for weeks after the snow had cleared!
- The grit is only for use on public roads and footpaths.
- Highways take too long to replenish stocks – this meant we had no grit for the Boxing Day covering (and still don't at the end of January).
- Dogs walking in the grit and ingesting it can become ill, or even die – always wash their paws if they have been exposed.
- the locking arrangements on the gritter shed caused some issues – this will be fixed.

Dates for your diary: The Village AGM/show will be on Sunday May 13th. More on that next month, including the search for the next 'Villagers of the Year'.

On Saturday 10th November There will be a multi-media outdoor event for the WW1 Centenary celebrations, followed by an all-village show in the evening. The Avening Angels have kindly agreed to organise the show, and will be looking for acts to represent each decade since 1918 – this could be singing, dancing, music, a poem, or an act. Get your creative juices flowing, and watch out for updates in this magazine, the website, and our Facebook page.


Stop Press: The plans for the playing field are now on the website, and have gone to CDC for planning approval. We will be working hard over the coming weeks to get grant funding in place for the works.



John William Catterall 1949 - 2017

Late last year I lost a good friend and Parish Council colleague – in fact it was John who encouraged me to join! He joined the PC soon after he and Jo moved to Avening, and he ensured the decisions we made always made good financial sense, and gave maximum benefit to the community. He played an active role helping to organise events and was always available to help local business and individuals develop their ideas. The eulogy below was presented at John's funeral; and later, friends, family and colleagues celebrated John's life at the Bell with a drink and a curry. As Jo said, John would have loved it!

John William Catterall, Johnny Boy, Jonny, the pig, Piggy, Andan - however you addressed him he was a Big Man in every sense, who wore his heart on his sleeve. In whatever capacity you knew John, you would recognise him from these qualities: generous, patient, honest, thoughtful, loving, caring, loyal, confident, intelligent, reliable, funny - REALLY funny. A party animal, a dedicated educator, and a mentor to all he knew. He gave so much to so many, truly a man who was out for all he could give. And, most importantly, he was a rock to his wife, Jo.

John was born in Shropshire in 1949. The only child of his hard-working parents, his constant childhood companion was the first in a long line of four-legged friends. Given John's love of Rottweilers, Cliquot was, surprisingly, a poodle.

John loved all sports. He trialled for England at table tennis and when he grew too tall to be a contender at national level he qualified as a coach.

Never taking the most direct route, John apprenticed as a toolmaker on leaving school, before studying accountancy at Birmingham University. After graduating he was invited to help at Camp America, where he had an epiphany as he watched the sun rising over the Grand Canyon. This formed part of his life's philosophy... to **Always Think Big.**

Returning to the UK, John embarked on a successful career as an accountant at Austin Rover before adapting his skills to computers, becoming a key salesman for a huge software company. As he said "I don't have to know how to use it to sell it".

John and Jo, with their complementary skills, developed the company that is now Regional Foster Placements. John was incredibly proud of the team of people he worked with and the company they had built up together over the years. His passion and determination to provide loving homes and life-changing care for children is what drove him to succeed.

During his first marriage John became a father to his daughter Nikki, and her three half-sisters. Several years later, after finding love with his soulmate Jo, he was delighted to also gain a teenage son, Ben. Children have a habit of growing up and starting their own families, and John was a devoted grandfather to William, Emmy,

Poppy, Olivia and Iris. My own children, Euan and Ailish, also adopted him as their extra grandfather.

So that's a very brief summary of John's family and working life, but now I'd like to tell you a couple of the Adventures John instigated:

Jo would like to title one of her Adventure's with John as "The Lost Convoy". John's absolute joy was driving his Jaguar XJS. He had sold Jo on the promise of a tasting tour of the vineyards of the Champagne region. Dozens of Jaguars, all touring together on a pre-determined route, stopping frequently to sample the delights of each vineyard – good food, good wine, great company; what's not to like? John dismissed the suggestion of a touring map or sat-nav; after all, there would be so many other cars to follow in the convoy! What he hadn't factored was that every other driver had made the same assumption and on entering the inner city of Reims, with its tangle of pedestrian zones and 'entree interdite' signs there was a panicked classic Jag driver to be spotted at many a crossroads desperately trying to switch lanes to follow that JAG to yet another no through road and inevitable 12-point turn!

Ben's Adventures with John were extensive: this one is remembered as 'A Ballast of Balustrades'. John was an avid 'eBayer', expert at spotting bargain building supplies to complete his house renovation on budget, which led him to call in many favours with friends and family to 'help' him retrieve his purchases from all corners of the British Isles. On this occasion, John had purchased a job lot of concrete balustrades. Ben was volunteered into driving the small hire van to an obscure and far-flung Welsh village. While John stood and tried to re-negotiate the already-agreed price, it became blatantly obvious that he had bought a disproportionately large amount of balustrade, compared to the vehicle hired. But as the logistical part of the operation had been farmed out to Ben, John felt no need to be involved in the loading of the purchase, or interested in the legal laden weight of the hire van. Having filled the van to approximately 5 times the weight it was designed to carry, Ben refused to load any further, for fear of the Severn Bridge giving way on their crossing back - and to this day, there is still a small Welsh mountain of balustrade, awaiting collection.

A key component of any Adventure with John was his insistence on a photographic or video record. Weddings, holidays, special occasions, you name it, everything would be filmed. The pavements and flagstones of Madeira and Venice have never been so well or so accidentally documented, in fact my own wedding was "filmed" by John but he chose to never share the footage with myself or Cat.

So when you think of John, think of him with a rotti by his side, or more probably on his lap, sharing a packet of shortbread biscuits and a mug of proper Yorkshire tea whilst watching the Ashes on Television in front of a roaring open fire.

“To understand the journey we must go back to the beginning

In August of 2015 Brian Powell came to us after the first of his now annual Skittlethons and handed us a cheque for over £700.00, telling us to donate it wherever we felt was suitable. So the five of us (Kate, Bomber, Jayme, Arron and Laura) sat around the table, as we often do and started throwing around ideas, Winston’s Wish (for bereaved children), survivors of suicide and so on... But as it often is with these big charities, nothing quite fitted the bill of what we were looking for, nowhere seemed quite important enough to send the money that Brian and Jane had lovingly raised.

With a bit more thought (and a few more cups of tea) Kate said, Why don't we start our own charity? We could raise funds and give out grants to those who need them, for things like uniforms etc. After some research and the beginning of a lot of paperwork, The Mark Townsend Charitable Trust was born.

Initially the committee consisted of Mark's brothers, Bomber and Pete, Mark's sister-in-law Kate, Mark's nieces and nephew, Jayme, Laura and Arronthen we added in some of Mark's favourite people like Brian Powell, Mike Stone, Shane Ludlow and Dan Sharpe – more recently we've added Sam to our team and two years later, we can safely say that we began as friends but we are now a family.

We give grants to help people in life, which can range from uniforms to trips to get well hampers, and from counselling to blenders or hospital costs. We will consider most things, although most of our grants are in the local area of Avening, Nailsworth, Minchinhampton and Stroud.

Our fundraising activities range from a 100 Club (see page 26) to Hoedowns to Bingo

Minchinhampton Post Office

We bought the post office on 24th November 2010. This year we will start our eighth year and our eighth Christmas. Unfortunately, our income from the post office has been falling year after year. This is due to the changes being introduced by the Post Office. They have updated their technology and so have reduced the money we receive for each item we process. We have also seen government products withdrawn from us.

To keep the post office, people need to use us as much as possible. We do receive a small payment for every cash withdrawal and it is free for customers.

The shop is leased by us and is essential in keeping the post office open. All products in the shop are bought by us; nothing is supplied by the Post Office. So, by buying mail boxes, mail bags and Sellotape you will be helping to keep us open.

Our roles are: Eric does all the administration for the post office and I buy all the shop stock. I love choosing all the cards and try to get a wide range to suit all tastes. I am always trying to find things to sell that people would like us to stock. We have a dry-cleaning service and fit batteries into ordinary day watches (not high value).

We do have a core number of customers, who support us by buying from us regularly and we would like to thank them and let them know we appreciate their support.

As banks are closing we now do more banking services, cash and cheque deposits. We do mobile top-ups and gas card and electric key top-ups.

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Avening Home-Workers Lunch



The widespread use of broadband internet and email have revolutionised the working patterns of many people. Unlike previous generations of workers who left home early to travel to a distant workplace and did not return until evening, contemporary workers of all types frequently base themselves from home and avoid commuting to distant offices or factories. Workers in Avening are no different, with the advent of high-speed broadband to the village allowing many of them to work from a home-base one or two days per week, or even more. This has created great benefits to work/life balance in time

saved from tedious commuting, as well as the savings in spending on expensive fuel and public transport.

It does have drawbacks however in the reduction of time spent with work colleagues and in the lack of social interaction which is available at employers' workplaces. This can be particularly felt at Christmas time when many people in traditional employment centres kick off their festive celebrations with works parties and lunches. It is not so easy for solitary workers based at home to socialise and network.

For that reason a group of home-based workers and sole traders in Avening has been coming together informally for the last few years to create a festive event with their like-minded neighbours. In December 2017 some 20 individuals combined their celebrations with an excellent Christmas lunch at the Queen Matilda Public House. Ladies and gentlemen working in diverse fields ranging from gardening and tree surgery, to house-cleaning, editing, printing and IT consultancy were able to enjoy a very pleasant few hours, meeting neighbours in similar situations, sharing experiences and exchanging business cards.

It is hoped that get-togethers and events aimed at home-based workers in Avening can be organised more frequently going forward. 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

It takes a VILLAGE

How well do you know your neighbours? Clare Steele knew hers pretty well, but even she was astounded at how they came together to bring a remarkable idea to life...

Turning on the TV, I watched the news, knowing I would be horrified at what I saw. It was the summer of 2016 when the refugee crisis was the big story. Every day there were more distressing images of refugees risking their lives to find a friendly country where they could make a fresh start. Who could forget the heartbreaking images of the little boy washed up on a Turkish beach? Although it was almost unbearable to watch, I couldn't turn away. I was haunted



by what was happening so close to home and I wondered what contribution I could possibly make. My work involves delivering secular funerals and also traditional storytelling, meaning I perform stories in my own style to an audience. I didn't think any of my skills could be used to make a difference to the refugees. I felt helpless in my safe, comfortable home, tucked away in a quaint Cotswolds village. I'd never been happier since moving to Avening 18 years before. Living in a small village may not be everyone's cup of tea but I moved around a lot when I was younger and felt truly at home bringing up

Avening featured in the national press at the beginning of the year - and for a very good reason. The January edition of Good Housekeeping Magazine included an article by Avening resident Clare Steele, the first part of which is copied on the opposite page. It was about the children's book '**Ten Thousand Bowls of Soup**', written by Clare and fellow Avening resident Ross Frewin, illustrated by Avening resident Pip Morrison, featuring ex-Avening School pupil Henry and ultimately published and marketed by a team from Avening. The book was written to raise awareness of the plight of refugees and all proceeds go to Médecins Sans Frontières, everyone having given their time and expertise for free.

It was wonderful to read about this fantastic project, and to realise that people throughout the country (I was sent a copy of the article by a friend in East Sussex!) - and possibly beyond - were hearing about our beautiful village and the amazing community we have here; it made me very proud, and also made me realise how very many talented people live in our small village.

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
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Avening School

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Down to Earth

A very Happy New Year's Gardening to everyone! As the gardening year has scarcely begun, there is still time for some resolutions and there is one very obvious one: to reduce our use of and reliance on plastic! For wildlife, our health and, last but not least – aesthetic reasons. Thank you Sir David! Who would have thought a year ago that the awareness of the pernicious side-effects of using and discarding plastic would be so universal.

Thanks to television – not a phrase I would naturally employ – and the Blue Planet 2 series, we have all been enlightened and horrified about the plastic in our oceans. Long may the horror last and drive us on to more earth and ocean-friendly habits!

If plastic does not biodegrade, you might think, why should it be harmful. Well, it is nearly a decade now since first reports were made public of the way plastic in food containers leached bisphenol A and phthalates – into our digestive systems! Bisphenol A and phthalates both contain an endocrine-disrupting chemical and this has been implicated in the rise of diseases including autoimmune diseases, cancer, neurological diseases and infertility.

But even if we give up plastic bottles and plastic food containers (not an easy one, I'll admit) there are other ways in which plastic harms us. Plastic microparticles are absorbed by lower organisms and perpetuate by bioaccumulation. We are at the top of the food chain and thus, by a process of biomagnification we ingest those very toxins.

What relevance does this have for gardening, you may well ask? The gardening industry is a massive consumer of plastic. Just go into the local garden centre and look around. It is not enough to say that the plastic can go into the recycling container; besides, China doesn't want our plastic for recycling any longer. Why should they take our rubbish – and then simply return it to us as more rubbish (but this time, 'rubbish' in a different sense of the word!)?

I recently visited Burford Garden Company. It was possible to stand in a

'department' (tools, for example) and see absolutely no plastic packaging. There were peat-free fibre pots (which I bought) and sheeps' wool made into biodegradable garden fleece. All very stylish, too. (If a little pricey!) Do visit if you haven't already. This is no ordinary garden centre.

Then there is the matter of tea bags. I have always composted tea-bags, but recently been a little surprised to find them in an identifiable state in the garden. Most of the major tea companies admit to using some polypropylene or silicone in the sealant of tea bags. Many years ago I toured a tea plantation in Ceylon (as it then was) and remember being told that the dust and sweepings were used in tea bags. How the tea companies must have rubbed their hands in glee when we went over the edge like lemmings into an era of mass tea bag use. Well, no more for me. I don't wish to drink boiled polypropylene or silicone, nor do I wish it to enter my compost! Leaf tea is still out there and much, much nicer!



Biodegradable fibre pots

An alternative to plastic pots is a very difficult challenge for a nursery. I spoke to the owner of Fibrex Nursery, an independent nursery near Stratford on Avon. For mail order they use fibre pots, but plastic pots are still used for plants 'on the shelves'. But, I was told, they wash plastic pots and reuse them. (Very impressive.) Also, they collect up newspapers and cardboard from the village to use in packaging and for customers to take their purchases away in; they are sourcing paper bags rather than plastic for this year's garden shows.



To eliminate plastic absolutely in the garden is an ideal that is neither realistic nor realisable, but we can take measures to REDUCE it.

You may have read about Aberporth, on the Welsh coast, and Modbury in Devon where villagers have taken collective action to reduce their use of plastic. What can we do in our village? Suggestions, please!


