Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



Firstly some sad news – after almost 25 years in the role Click Mitchell has decided to retire as a parish councillor. Click’s contribution over this time is immeasurable, but most recently she will be remembered for being instrumental in organising the Pig Face day celebration last year, and of course the truly memorable WW1 son-et-lumiere. Click’s depth of experience and never ending flow of ideas will be greatly missed, but she has promised to help with future events. We wish her all the best for the future.

This does of course mean we have a vacancy in the team, and we have started the search for a new member – if you would like to join us or find out more before applying, ask any councillor or contact the clerk for more details.

The various roadworks rumble on through the village, and the multitude of traffic lights is gradually reducing. When the set by the golf club kept failing (one of 3 sets up to the Ragged Cot!), I asked Highways to speak to the operator which they duly did, and the situation improved. We have also asked Gigaclear to provide more information about when and where they will be digging.

There has been a big focus on litter picking recently – the Café organised a very successful clean up, and the school cleared the field in the last week of term. There will be another chance to join in along the Nailsworth Road down to a stop off at the Weighbridge in the summer, so look out for details. Thanks to everyone who organised and took part. We’re investigating if a bin can be placed by the hut in the field, but I think collection could be an obstacle.

Still in the field, the first stage of the path upgrade has been completed with a temporary surface, and the next stage will be to upgrade the section from there around the play equipment to the centre gate, plus a new section to the south east gate. The fence around the play equipment should be installed in August, and we will also replace the worn out gates to be more accessible. We have updated the planning application at CDC, and this simpler scheme should be available for comment soon.

We have received the results of traffic surveys we commissioned – we still need to digest the results fully, but two interesting headlines are:

- Average weekday vehicle movements on Tetbury Hill is around 3500
- Average speed on the Nailsworth road in the 30mph zone is 49mph!

The PC enthusiastically supported the initiative by Katy Upton to set up a new mother and toddler group, and we are very pleased to hear the initial meeting was a great success – the regular sessions will start in September.

Another local initiative championed by Jennie South was to hang flower baskets on the Memorial Hall. Paul Nelson planted them all up and we have installed an automatic watering system so Jennie and Gerald don't have to go down every night with a watering can - I'm sure you'll agree that the baskets look beautiful!

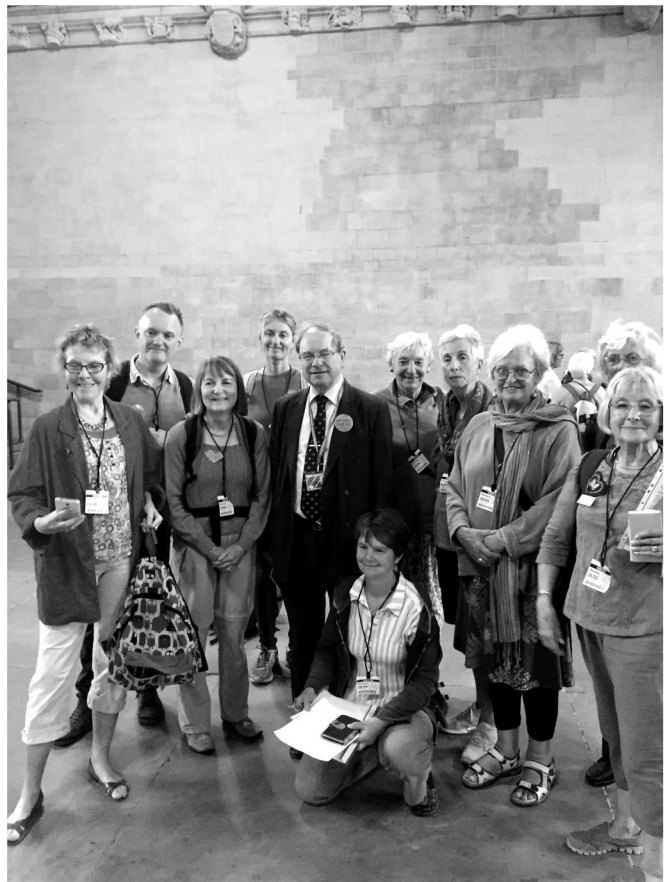

At the end of June, twenty eight members from Avening WI spent an enjoyable evening hosted by Tetbury WI at The Goods Shed. It was a lovely venue and we had a delicious cold supper followed by strawberries and a slice of Tetbury's 50th Anniversary cake, cut by two founder members. The guest speaker was Caroline Lowsley-Williams who gave a very entertaining talk about her family and life at Chavenage House. At the moment the house is best known as Trenwith in Poldark, now in its final series, and Poldark money has greatly helped in the upkeep of the house. Caroline's proudest claim to fame was that Ross Poldark has undressed in her bedroom, though she stressed that she was not present at the time!

Two of our members, Gwyneth and Cas, recently joined with other Gloucestershire WI members and headed to London for The Time is Now, a mass lobby for climate and environmental action. They met with local MP, Geoffrey Clifton-Brown, in Westminster Hall and had good discussions on some important topics. He pledged support on several issues including the reintroduction of feed-in tariffs to encourage the use of solar power; new environmental standards for new build and social housing on insulation and power; and the use of microfilters on washing and drying machines to prevent plastic microfibres entering the marine food chain. He is planning a 10 minute bill to include some of the ideas discussed and will keep the group informed of the outcome.



Our skittles team have continued their success in the County competition with a narrow win over Uley WI, and are now due to meet Twyver WI in the next round. Good luck team!

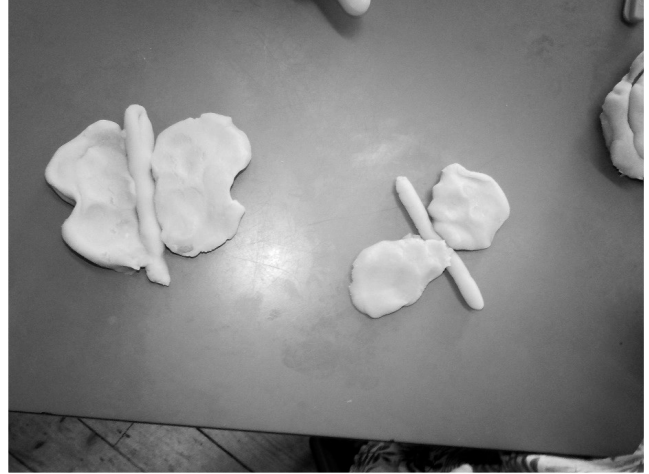

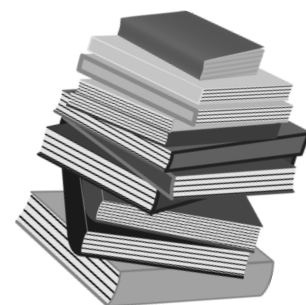

Wild about Avening

This month I'm highlighting the humble hedgehog. Probably the most easily recognised of British mammals and one of the most loved thanks to Mrs Tiggywinkle. These little 'hedge pigs' (named for the incredible pig-like grunts they can emit) were once a familiar sight in all villages. Now, however, they have declined to such low levels that I expect that many children in the village have never had the chance to see one in the wild. Their decline is so catastrophic that there are estimated to be only 1 million left in Britain; a stark difference from the 35 million there were in the 1960s. Their decline is thought to be due to loss of their habitats (hedgerows, woodlands, meadows); loss of the food they rely on (insects, slugs & snails); more traffic on the roads; and pesticide use (slug pellets).

But let's focus on the positives and look at what we can do to reverse this decline and make Avening a hedgehog haven!

1. Hedgehog highways: Make sure hedgehogs can get in and out of your garden. Fences have replaced hedgerows in many gardens and this has stopped hedgehogs moving freely and in some cases has pushed them onto the roads where many unfortunately don't survive. Let hedgehogs in your garden by making a



- small hole in the bottom of your fence (15cmx15cm). Ask your neighbours to do it too and let's see which street in the village can make the longest hedgehog highway or see if can connect the whole village and make a hedgehog republic (www.hedghehogrepublic.org)!
2. Put food out: Cat food and a shallow dish of water put out under a small shelter that only hedgehogs can access can make a real difference. Please NEVER give hedgehogs milk and bread as this can make them really sick.
3. Be less tidy: All our wildlife would benefit from us being a little less tidy in the garden. Leave a small pile of leaves and branches, and/or make a compost heap somewhere in your garden for hedgehogs to nest in; or make a hedgehog box for them to use. Hedgehogs are a gardener's best

friend, perfect for controlling slugs and snails.

4. Slug pellets: Please consider an alternative for slug pellets. The chemical in these can harm a hedgehog's ability to reproduce and if they eat enough slugs containing this chemical they can die (the use of this chemical will be banned in 2020). I have found wool pellets work well but there are many other hedgehog-friendly solutions to try (check out the RSPB website for more information).

If we all do just one of these things we will hopefully see hedgehog numbers in the village increase and we could make a big difference to the survival of these wonderful animals, ensuring they are around for future generations to enjoy.

Nature Notes

1. Otters: This month I found otter spraint (droppings) on the river right outside the Village Hall. How lucky to have otters passing through the village!
2. Orchids and wildflowers: What an incredible display of orchids and wildflowers as you go up Hampton Hill. A brilliant example of what can be achieved by managing verges more sensitively. Did you know that Dorset County Council adopted a new way of managing its road verges and roundabouts in 2014? By altering the normal cutting regime (cutting later in the year after seeds have set), and collecting all the grass clippings after each cut, the verges have become wildflower and wildlife havens and the council has already saved over £100,000 in management costs! A win-win situation and something that other councils will hopefully adopt in the future.

Readers may also be interested to know a bit more about Richard Williams of Cherington Lane Forge, whose picture appears on this month's cover. Charles Rymer tells us: Richard's late father, Graham Williams bought the business in Rodmarton from Frank Baldwin, who was himself a farrier, in 1976. Graham then grew the business, moving to a larger site in Rodmarton in the late 1970s. Then around 1991 he bought the farm buildings and farm house at Summerwell, renaming it Cherington Lane Forge, (the present site), to which he transferred the whole business.

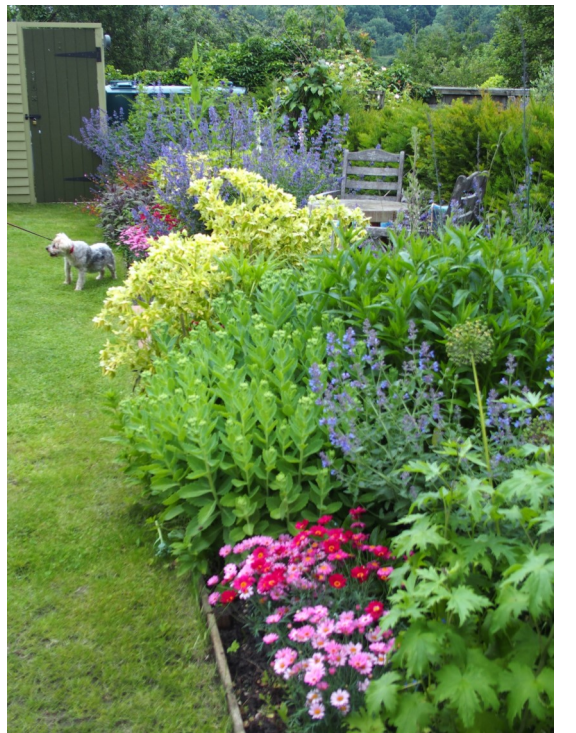

Woodstock Lane Swimming Pool

The Woodstock Lane swimming pool was created in 1940 when, with the threat of invasion, the Government decided to defend the country with a line of trenches from Highbridge in a semi-circle to the River Severn near Gloucester. Details of this work can be found in Major Green's book "War Walks Stop Line Green".

The trench through near Woodstock cut through the stream in Pool Hay, which was then the Avening playing field. The trench then filled with water to a depth of 6ft, making an ideal swimming pool for us youngsters. This of course was considered dangerous and several attempts were made to divert the water from the trench. All this failed and we continued swimming in the pool. Also by then the pool had become a wildlife centre for trout, eels, minnows etc.

By the time the threat of invasion was over the trenches were filled in. You can still see the traces of the trench and the pill boxes near Star Farm.

Down Memory Lane

Readers may recall the items sent in by Paul Godwin last month. His memories and his Aunt Florrie's poem have sparked some very positive reactions.

Immediately after the July edition had come out, one of our editors received a telephone call from Sylvia Fletcher (nee Stone), now nearly 93, who lived much of her life here in Avening. She said how much she had been moved by Mrs May's 'Tribute to Avening', which brought back so many memories of an idyllic childhood spent in Avening.

Hazel Redding (ex Hazelwood) of Tetbury writes:

'I was interested to read Mr. Paul Godwin's article on page 26 of the Villager. I went round the churchyard today and made notes of the deceased Godwins: namely, Derek, who died in 1996 and his wife Pamela, who died in 2013. and I wondered if these are related to Paul. Derek lived in the cottages opposite the Weighbridge and had quite a responsible job at Longfords Mill. There was also a Steven Godwin who died in 1994. I hope this information will be of use to Paul.'

She also says: 'Re Marshall May you mentioned in this month's magazine, he kept stables off the High St. in the grounds of Sandford House, which I regularly attended. Two shilling and sixpence per hour, I remember to hire a pony/horse. Nothing like taking a horse for a ride up the back of Hazel Wood for a gallop. I do not remember any of the others mentioned in Mr. Godwin's memoirs - a bit before my time! He lived in a terraced cottage up Point Road; and introduced me to Stow Fair (horses).

And more memories of Marshall May

I remember Marshall May, mentioned as the village baker in the article "Down Memory Lane" in last month's Villager. Indeed Marshall was responsible for bringing me to Avening over 50 years ago!

Marshall ran the bakery on the corner of Point Road (oh, the heavenly smell of fresh bread baking in the early mornings!), and he lived in a cottage just further along Point Road. We formed a friendship based on our love of horses, and over a cup of strong tea, he would regale me with tales of his boyhood helping with the workhorses on Church Farm, and his days spent in a cavalry unit in World War 1, while my children played with his cats in the garden. The bread from the bakery was delivered to the surrounding villages by a horse drawn canvas covered wagon; I have a water colour print of the wagon being driven past Church Farm.

But as well as being the village baker, Marshall also kept several horses and ponies in the stable yard of Sandford House, grazing them in the orchards and meadows stretching along to Brook House (now covered by Sandford Leaze). He fed them any stale bread from the bakery, and would sometimes loan them out for local hacking in the surrounding countryside.



I was then living in Little Somerford with my four small children; I cannot remember how I first came to hear of

Marshall May and his horses. We had to leave our own horses behind when we moved there, the children were missing their ponies dreadfully so one autumn afternoon, driving through Avening after an outing to Minchinhampton Common, we decided to look him up. A few days later we were all enjoying riding out in the lovely surrounding countryside on Seagull, Cobweb, Bella, Scout and Sergeant, all suitably graded in size to meet our requirements! Thereafter it became a regular weekly engagement so much enjoyed, and all for 5/-!

Then one Spring morning as we were riding back up West End Lane from a lovely ride enjoying the bluebells in Hazelwood, we spotted a for sale sign outside Vale Farmhouse (now divided into Heronsmead and Somerford House). At the time we were looking for a house nearer Tetbury, and after a viewing and a cup of tea on the lawn with Rover Ross, who lived there then, it was love at first sight! A month or so later we bought the house at an auction sale at the George Hotel in Nailsworth. Thus began my long association with Avening we soon moved in to begin fifteen or so happy years there...

I kept up my friendship with Marshall for many years, one of the first things that I did after moving into Vale House, was to buy Apollo from him to start our new family of horses! There must still be many people in Avening who remember Marshal May and who knew him far better than I did, but I shall always be grateful to him for bringing me to Avening in the first place all those years ago.

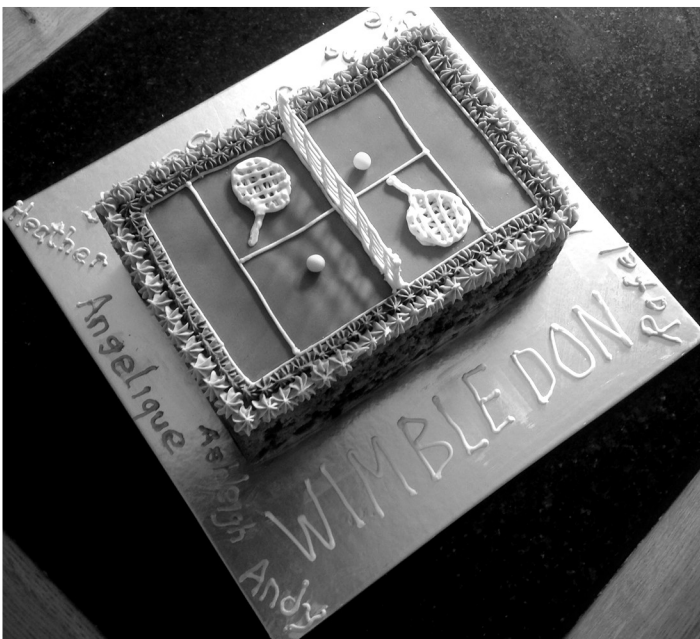

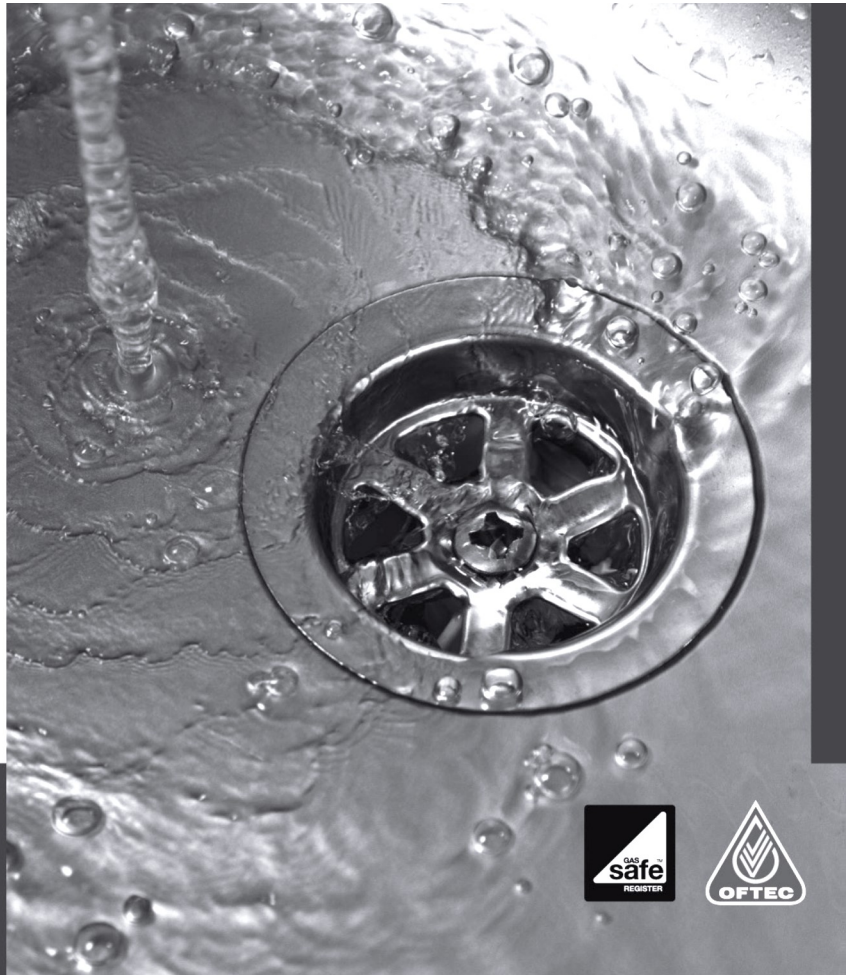
