



## The Parish Letter

We are told that the Anglican Communion is threatened with schism. The Anglo Catholics and the Evangelicals within the Church of England are threatening to break away from the 'middle of the road', more liberal, thinking part of the Church.

Those of you who may not have followed the goings on in the General Synod this last month must be wondering what it is that is proving so contentious and controversial.

What are the great issues that concern the Church in the 21<sup>st</sup> century? Is it the ever rising third world debt that subjects so many countries in Africa and South America to extreme poverty? Or is it the high incident of child mortality, or a child dying every minute of the day from hunger or disease, somewhere in the world? Is it the lack of clean water or the destruction of the rain forests? All issues that should concern the Church. Maybe it is the rise of the Islamic influence in the West, or the issue of unemployment in this country and the burden of individual debt? The unhappy state of our teenage children with their ever increasing dependency on alcohol and drugs?

No.....strangely enough it is none of these issues that have disturbed the Church hierarchy.

The day of heated debate within the Synod...the unleashed fury of the so called 'traditionalists'... the open defiance of certain groups of the clergy to the authority of the Archbishops.....is all over the issue of...... Women Bishops!

It would be laughable if it were not so tragic. The spectacle of indignant priests storming out of the chamber in protest is not only ridiculous but embarrassing, and deeply damaging to the church's image. The impression it gave to the World, both religious and secular, is of an institution which is 'out of touch' and only concerned with its own affairs.

The attitude of certain clergy reflects more of that of the High Priests and Pharisees of the Temple 2000 years ago, than that of the enlightened followers of Christ.

The Traditionalists appear to be driven by the fear of change and a refusal to trust the leading of the Holy Spirit.

How sad that the union of the Church of England should be threatened by such an irrelevance. In the scale of things how can it possibly matter whether a bishop is male of female? Can the colour purple really have such influence on us all?

Jesus came to free people from the restriction of the Jewish Law. Jesus offered them something new..... moving the focus from religious prejudice and control..... to the things that matter to God "Go and tend the widows, the orphans, the hungry, the destitute, the sick......those in prison. Care for one another, love one another."

Of course the affairs of the Church should be managed efficiently by those most qualified to do so.....and inevitably the time will come when women are made bishops, but in the scale of things it is no great matter. It is the Christian Mission which should be always foremost in our thoughts: to take the Gospel of Love to the World and to fight for justice and freedom for all people.

The World and her people are in great need, both spiritually and physically and are waiting for inspired and motivated leadership.

## **Avening Memorial Hall bookings**



## An Enchanting Walk

On a balmy evening in June, a group of people gathered at the gates of Avening Court for a very special walk through the gardens. We were greeted by our guide, Tony Russell, who led us up the drive, alongside the lake and stream, pointing out interesting trees on the way. Our first stop was in the Italianate formal gardens where the topiary and roses were at their magnificent best



Then on to the less formal grounds nearer the house. Here the stream widens into a series of pools with waterside planting and the setting sun glinting on the water was magical. But our prime interest was to learn about the trees; among many species, these included a gigantic Wellingtonia, a 'Handkerchief Tree', Ernest Wilson's magnificent cherry and a most interesting walnut tree. This tree, nearly 400 years old, is said to have been used as the gallows for the unfortunate victims tried at the court of Judge Jeffries during the Bloody Assizes in the late 17th century. Now reclining at an angle across the stream and partially supported, it is still very much alive despite its great age. A chilling memory of former times.

Tony shared his fund of stories about the early plant collectors who brought so many specimens to our shores from places as far away as South America and China - not easy places to explore in those days. Our woodland and gardens would be poorer places without the many varieties these provide. We were reminded of the old adage (definitely not PC in the 21st century) -"a dog, a wife and a

walnut tree, the more you beat 'em, the better they be" certainly not true with regard to a dog and a wife, but apparently beating the trunk of a walnut tree is said to actually encourage fruiting!

The walk ended on the lawn at Avening Court where we met up with a second group who were about to set out with Tony on the same route. We all enjoyed a glass of wine and canapés which rounded off a perfect evening.

We are grateful for Tony for guiding us and to Karin and Jack Richards for their hospitality.

## Avening - Where Nothing Happens...

#### Francis de Paravicini

#### Vicar of Holy Cross Church, Avening (1856 to 1894)

In the June edition of this magazine, I quoted Francis' writing in the Parish Magazine "Home Works", published on the 1st of April, 1889, when he takes up the subject of Avening Common and the "bloodless coup" earlier in the 19th century, which led to the Common being "no more".

His article compared Avening village life in 1889 to that of seventy years earlier and he goes on to talk about education. He says:

"Of what are now reckoned ordinary home comforts the poor of those days could not have had any. How they obtained food and clothing enough, even of the coarsest kinds, with which to maintain life in health and strength, it is hard to imagine.

And education had not then instructed the dwellers in the poorer homes. A village dame may, perhaps, have taught a few of the young ones to read; and the rents of the Sandford Charity Estate, before it was stolen from the parish, doubtless paid that dame to teach some twelve favoured poor boys, for whom clothing the Charity also provided. But even of that educational advantage the homes of the poor were soon after deprived, when the Sandford Estate was actually stolen from the parish, with its title-deeds, and with all the parish officer's account-books, which recorded the receipt and expenditure of the rents of that estate. Thus all traces of the identity of that estate, and even the proofs of its existence, in its title-deeds, with the LEGAL agreement under which the parishioners had allowed the Common to remain closed for a definite time, and for a special yearly pay-......"

And here the quotation ends as the following page of that edition is missing. Well now, what do we make of that?

In the Church on the west wall behind the organ and to the left of our War Memorial hangs a wooden board detailing the works of the Sandford Estate Charity, a portion of which is shown in this photo.

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# From our Foreign Correspondent previously based in Senegal....

## Ever wondered what happens to those old clothes you donate to Oxfam?

"Friperies" – a much better word in French than the English translation of "second-hand clothes" - is big business in Senegal. Throughout the capital city of Dakar there are roadside stalls selling used shirts, dresses, shoes, children's clothes, even underwear (clean, I hasten to add!). The stall holders who sell these items usually have to buy them from a small number of importers, who

are free to set prices as they wish. Since March 2007, however, Oxfam has been working to ensure that good quality clothes can be accessed by traders at all levels at competitive prices. When I was in Senegal in May (as illustrated in last months Villager!) I had the opportunity to witness this unique business in action.


Donated used clothes not sold in Oxfam shops in England are sent to a large warehouse in Huddersfield, and some of these - about 48 containers, or 1,200 tons - are shipped annually to Senegal, to be sorted and sold by an Oxfam private enterprise subsidiary, in Dakar called FripEthique. The company, which was set up in 2007, employs 25 people, with many others benefiting both directly and indirectly, thereby helping to reduce poverty through encouraging a vibrant private sector. It's amazing to watch the team of women rapidly working through large piles of clothing, deftly separating the items into over 40 distinct categories - everything from nightwear, trousers, children's dresses, baby clothes, men's shirts and T-shirts for all ages, to accessories such as baseball hats or belts, with additional categories for sheets, towels and material. Anything considered unusable as clothing is categorised as rag, but even this has a market. The women work hard, eight hour days in a frequently hot, dusty warehouse, but staff retention is excellent and there is a queue of women waiting to be employed should the opportunity arise. They have good salaries and, in comparison to similar jobs, excellent working conditions, with masks and gloves to protect them, and fans to reduce the heat.

The sorted clothes are put into large plastic sacks, and compressed into tightly-sealed bales weighing 45kg. They are available for anyone to purchase, from a market stall holder walking in off the street to buy a single bale of men's shirts, to a large scale dealer looking for a variety of clothing to supply to his customers throughout Dakar. According to FripEthique, traders are keen to buy from them because the quality of second-hand clothes from the UK is much higher than those received from other countries. A bale of cotton dresses sells for the equivalent of £65, while the highest selling item - surprising enough, a bale of bras - goes for about £200.

Food for thought when you next have a clear-out of your wardrobe!

In 1080 the building of Holy Cross Church was completed. Queen Matilda commissioned this out of remorse of her imprisoning Britric the Lord of the lands of Avening (from Tewkesbury to Worcester) when she married King William and came to England in 1066. Britric was sent to the Earl of Flanders as our Ambassador and the Earl's 14 year old daughter, Matilda, made a pass at him, which he rejected.

So 930 years ago, on Holy Cross Day (September 14<sup>th</sup>), the Royal couple came to the village and celebrated the consecration of the Church with a Hog roast (hog obtained from Gatcombe woods).

The school children will be told this as the very core of the history of the village in which they live. The Church has been central to the community for hundreds of years and it is hoped that this weekend will bring the community together yet again. The Parish Council has put forward sponsorship of £600 for which we are all very grateful. We aim to raise more to make it a fantastic event.

#### Avening Roll of Honour No. 28

#### Albert Henry Chipp

#### Private: 28th Battalion, Australian Infantry

Fate can be cruel but sometimes maybe benevolent. Such was the case with Albert Chipp. In 1911, he said fond farewells to his parents, brother and five sisters at their cottage on West End and emigrated to Perth, Western Australia. It is likely that they thought they would never meet again.

Albert settled as a painter and decorator at 46 Short Street, Perth but in December 1915 he volunteered for service with the Australian army. He enlisted in January 1916 and after training, set sail for France in the troopship "Ulysses" on the 1st of April that year, joining his unit at Etaples in August. Sometime during January 1917 he experienced difficulties with his left heel and was admitted to hospital in France on the 21st and was then transferred to Guildford War Hospital in Surrey. It took several weeks for his heel to recover and here fate stepped in again, as he was granted nine days leave in March prior to repatriation to France. One can imagine the joyous family reunion that took place in Avening early in March 1917.

Following his leave he was sent on to various training establishments in Southern England before leaving for France in October. He was caught up in a number of battles throughout the remainder of that year and, later, in the attempts to hold back the Germans' big push in April 1918. It was during the Allied counterattacks that followed when Albert lost his life, being killed on Monday the 10th of June. His records give a location of his burial but the search for him at the end of hostilities proved fruitless and it is likely that he is one of the unidentified soldiers buried at Villers-Bretonneux cemetery. He was just over 28 years of age, having been born at the family's West End home on Wednesday the 9th of April 1890. He was baptised in our church some six weeks later on Sunday the 1st of June.

His father, William Henry Chipp was born in Essex and had married Elizabeth Yates in 1887 at Chelsea. William was a gardener and, in Avening, worked for the Calcutt family who, at that time, lived at Avening Park. Albert was educated at Avening school and from the age of 14, served a five year apprenticeship with A E Drysdale, a company of plumbers in Nailsworth. He was unmarried. The awards of the Victory Medal and the British War Medal which, together with his Memorial Scroll, Memorial Plaque and "Where the Australians Rest" pamphlet, were received by his father in November 1922. We have found no relatives in the village but we have been able to familiarise his brother's granddaughter in Norfolk with the details of her family's hero. Albert is remembered, with honour, on our church War Memorial and on Memorials in Perth.




Fred Venning also recently found this photograph, taken around 1900 and presumed to be of some of the workforce at Longfords Mill.

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
### The Great Avening Scarecrow Trail



### A few words about local roads

Anyone travelling on the roads in and around Avening can't have failed to see what damage the harsh winter caused to the road surfaces. New potholes were appearing faster than they could be repaired, and even though all available resources in Gloucestershire Highways were diverted to the cause, it has taken many weeks of effort to get on top of the situation. Now Highways attention has been diverted to the job of prioritising the worst roads

for more permanent repairs or complete resurfacing.

Priority obviously Trunk qoes to roads, followed by A roads, B roads, and finally small lanes and local streets. The problem is that with limited funds over many years, local roads our have almost always

missed the cut. The lack of a long term repair and replacement programme for our minor roads has resulted in them gradually breaking down – and the winter snow and ice highlighted this all too clearly.

This situation is not likely to improve in the short term given the change of government and the state of the country's finances! However it is not all gloom and doom. The Parish Council has an excellent relationship with the team at Highways, and we regularly advise them of local hot spots that need attention, which are usually dealt with promptly.

Indeed at the height of the winter repairs, we advised them of multiple potholes along a stretch of local road; this was marked up by the evening and repaired the following day.

We have just completed the annual walk around the village with our main Highways contact, and this is what we can expect to see over the coming months:

- Clearer Give Way signs have already been placed at the junction around the Cross, and an additional 'pedestrians crossing' sign will be added soon. New 'SLOW' and 'Keep Clear' markings are also to be added to the road surface, all in an effort to make it safer for customers using the shop and pub. Highways will also be repairing the damaged gully/sunken drain on the High Street.
- The long planned patching along Westend is rising up the 'to do' list and will hopefully be done this year.
- The *Chavenage Lane* link from the Tetbury road is being reviewed with a view to the worst sections being re-laid.
- Separately, we understand that the gas main between Avening and Tetbury will be replaced in the next financial year – so unfortunately we'll have to put up with the smell of leaking gas for a while longer.
- The 'temporary' traffic lights by Longfords Mill may actually be history by Christmas! After almost 6 years, the work is being scheduled between September and December this year. It will mean the Nailsworth road being closed for up to 12 weeks, but the whole road should finally be fixed.

### **'Music for A While' Ensemble**

Those who attended this concert on Friday 16th July in Avening Church were privileged, in these beautiful surroundings, amply and beautifully decorated with the flowers prepared for a wedding on the morrow, to be transported in time back to the age of the Baroque era.

The "Music for a While" ensemble - Katy Bircher, Flute; Katherina Sprekelsen, Oboe; Jonathan Manson, Cello; James Johnstone, Harpsichord, under the leadership of Margaret Faultless, violin, treated us to an evening of "Bach and Friends", incorporating the melodious sounds of baroque-style instruments.

The programme of chamber music by J.S Bach and Telemann would have brought delight to the ears of their ducal patrons at the court of Weimar. Johann Sebastian Bach and Georg Philip Telemann were contemporaries. They knew each other well; in 1714 Telemann became godfather to Johann's son, Carl Philipp Emanuel.

We heard both a Trio and a Quartet from Telemann's Tafelmusik : a collection of music in lighter style intended for playing to accompany banquets. The Bach programme included the Suite for solo Cello no 1 in G major, a Trio in G major and a Sonata for Violin and Harpsichord in C minor.

In addition we were introduced to the Ricercar. I think few of us knew this term, meaning:-

"To seek out. As noun, applied musically in 16th to 18th cents. to an elaborate contrapuntal instrumental composition in fugal or canonic style (a famous example being that by Bach in <u>Das</u> <u>musikalische Opfer</u>,.)"

We were treated to two Ricercar pieces from Bach's Musical Offering; a three part Ricercar before the interval, during which wine and canapés were served in the churchyard, and once the audience was fortified, a six part Ricercar.



The musicians delighted a full audience with their musical excellence and sheer enjoyment of the music they were presenting. The icing on the cake was that the programme was sponsored by the Cecil King Memorial Foundation, which ensured that the proceeds from ticket sales could go completely into the church fabric fund. We were able to bank £1,410 in the Queen Matilda Fund as a result of the generosity of the Cecil King Foundation and the hard work of our "Music for a While" team.

There were 8 substantiated crimes between May and June 2010, this compares to 2 for the same period of 2009.


