Letter from Chairman of Avening Parish Council



Spring is in the air and the countryside is showing signs of coming to life. Hopefully over the coming weeks you will spot some signs that the village has some 'green shoots' of improvements; such as: -

A Defibrillator: has now been installed on the main entrance side of the Memorial Hall. At night it stands out like a yellow beacon so it should be an easy find if you are unfortunate enough to need its services. In the coming weeks we are going to provide a couple of Saturday mornings whereby villagers can turn up to receive free instructions by a trained professional on how and when to use it.

Memorial Hall: Work on a new heating system is scheduled to start on 27th March, during the school Easter break. I'm sure everyone who uses the hall on a regular basis will welcome this; I know from experience how cold it can be, especially if you are seated for a meeting, film show or similar.

Talks with the Athelstan Trust over the fine tuning of the school's lease for the use of the hall continue. The Hall Trustees are anxious that they fulfil their duty to protect the interests of the Memorial Hall, which is a registered charity and has to operate within designated regulations.

Pavement Fouling: Normally it's dog poo that causes complaints. However, recently I have had comments from parishioners that there have been instances of horse poo on the pavements. Being animals who are on the larger size, their deposits are correspondingly in proportion. The net result is that pedestrians may have to step into the road to bypass obstructions. I will admit that I'm very sympathetic to horses. Given the way that they have been treated over the centuries, and their natural beauty, I'm inclined to give them some 'slack' over minor indiscretions. Unlike dog poo, it is not practical to ask owners to 'pick up' after them. I think that practice disappeared with Steptoe's rag and bone cart. There may be a lucky rose grower who finds an unexpected present; but by and large the poo remains until rain and nature takes care of it. However, the blocking of pavements is a legitimate concern. I believe by law, horses should not be ridden on the pavements (I fully realise that it is unavoidable if traffic conditions dictate it to be the safest option). In the interests of everyone; can I ask all horse riders to try to stay on the road, increasing the chances that the 'back end' of your horse is most likely not over the pavement.

Dog owners – please continue to pick up after your animals.

Nailsworth Bowls Club: They have contacted me to help spread the word that they would welcome new members. Free taster evenings are available each Friday from the start of the season in April. Details are on their website.

Avening Parish Council AGM: Lastly, please note that we will be holding our Avening Parish Council public meeting, on the morning of Saturday 18th May at the Social Club.

Start time of 10.00am.; scheduled for a minimum of 1 hour, the length of the meeting will depend on the attendance and matters discussed. This is an opportunity for villagers to hear a resume of the previous year's parish business and to direct any questions to the councillors on any appropriate subject or concerns.



Geoff Trinder 1954 - 2024



The following tribute to Geoff was read at his service and Mel has kindly given permission for this to be shared to everyone.

Geoff was born in Cherington on 4 April 1954, the eighth child of a family of nine. With so many siblings, Geoff grew up in an environment where the children made their own fun – and lots of it - entertaining themselves by building racetracks in the garden and swings in the woods. This was a time when children were given much greater freedom and expected to look after themselves - usually outside and almost always with other kids. There was never a dull moment, and that continued when, in

1966, the family moved to Avening. Being part of a big family also had some downsides: Mel remembers Geoff telling her that he used to share a bed with brothers and very often fell out when they turned over. Although the second youngest, Geoff shouldered his part of family responsibility, especially for his youngest brother, Chris; Geoff taught him how to tie his shoelaces, how to tell the time and, so important for a lad in the 1960s, that special social skill - how to smoke. That close, shared upbringing developed a strong family bond. Although in adulthood, Geoff didn't see his siblings as often as they *all* would have liked, he spoke of them all often and with great fondness. Geoff especially held his sister, Margaret, very dear as she had looked after him when his first marriage failed. And his brother, Jim, the eldest brother, was regarded as something akin to the family's messiah; and whenever Geoff asked Mel to tell his family anything it was always 'ring our Jimmy.'

Indeed, it was Jim who got Geoff his first job in a mill. The only issue was that Geoff was still at school and although he asked his teachers all the time if he could leave as his brother had got him a job, the school's answer was NO. However, Geoff finally got his way and went to work. And he was dedicated and hardworking - he never had a day off sick and he was a good provider for his family. Geoff also enjoyed his leisure time. There was always good community socialising in Avening in its pubs and social club. Geoff was also into motor cycling – and his interest extended to car races too. Neil recalls that on one occasion when he and Geoff and a friend, Jim Snell, went to Silverstone. They had bought a tent from Jock Hamilton, a friend of Geoff's so that they could camp there ready for the Formula One grand prix. However, when they arrived, they had forgotten how to erect the tent. Nonetheless, they got to work. A media crew arrived while they were doing so and asked them for an interview. Jim stepped up to talk to media crew while Geoff and Neil continued, laughing as they tried to put up the tent which was supposed to have an entry porch, a large flap of canvas. But by the time they got round to fixing the porch, they gave up and tied the flap of material in a bow instead. Three men in a tent with a large decorative bow! Neil recalls that it got some looks... people thinking no doubt that this was putting the 'camp' into camping!

In the early 1980s Geoff met Sandra, a single mother who had a child from her previous relationship, a daughter Melanie Spraul, known as Mel. As a single parent, Sandra with baby Mel moved in with her brother, David, who supported them in those early days until Sandra met Geoff and they moved in together and set about establishing an enduring loving and supportive family unit. When Mel was 6 years old, Geoff and Sandra were married on 19th December 1987 in the Cirencester Registry Office. It was for both Geoff and Sandra, the most important day of their lives. Theirs was to be a very happy marriage, a marriage full of fun and laughter - they were always messing around and calling each other nicknames at home. It was a marriage that stood the test of time - almost 35 years – until Sandra's death in July 2022.

From the start of his relationship with Sandra, Geoff was a wonderfully loving stepfather to Mel, in her words, 'The Best.' Geoff didn't have his own children, but he loved Mel as his own and that love was reciprocated by Mel. When Mel was growing up at home, it was a standing joke that Geoff rarely used his knife. When Mel would ask Geoff 'why not', he would simply reply, 'Now look, there was 9 of us kids at home. You were lucky if you had a knife AND a fork to use.' Mel loved that Geoff had such dry humour that always made Mel chuckle. Of course, with a father of her own, Ian Spraul, who is here today to support Mel, she called Geoff by his name. Although, as Mel grew into her teenage years, she often used the nickname, *Trin* (from his surname Trinder) and Geoff in turn used a nickname for Mel, *Sprook*, from her surname, Spaul. Mel has said she has been lucky to have loving and supporting parents and stepparents in her life. It is especially pleasing that, in recent times, her dad Ian and stepdad Geoff would sit in Mel's lounge watching sport and chatting when Ian came to visit – in Mel's words, *'it was just lovely.'*

After their marriage Geoff and Sandra would socialise on weekends with their best friends, Terry and Jenny Francis. All four were regulars at the Avening Social Club, but as Geoff and Sandra were known for being late, Terry's usual greeting as they entered was, *'What time do you call this?*During these years, and indeed for the greater part of their lives, Geoff and Sandra had lived in Avening. However, in 2018, they relocated to Pathfinder Village, in Devon. Their decision had been influenced in part as they had holidayed many times in East Devon, not far from Exmouth, at a large seaside caravan resort on Sandy Bay, often with Mel, Neil and their grandchildren.

While they enjoyed the lifestyle at Pathfinder Village and had made many new friends, as time passed, they missed being away from family and long-time friends. So, in 2022, Geoff and Sandra moved back closer to their 'home' area to St John's Park at Lechlade. One of the big attractions of coming back to this part of the country was once again living closer to Mel – although not as close as they had been when they had lived in Avening in a close-knit community of family and friends. For example, when Mel married Neil, they settled down as near neighbours to Geoff and Sandra in Avening. Of course, they had been delighted when a first grandchild was born, a grandson, Alex, in 2005; and then their second grandchild, a granddaughter, Mia, in 2011. Both Geoff and Sandra just loved them to bits. Geoff worshipped his grandchildren. Even at Pathfinder Village, they were in constant contact with Mel and family. Alex bought Geoff and Sandra an *Alexa* and Sandra

would laugh as *Alexa* would *never* answer to Geoff. Sandra jokingly explained to Geoff that Alexa wouldn't reply to *him* because *he was just too gruff*!

Although this regular contact meant everything to Geoff and Sandra, it also underscored the fact that they were missing day-to-day contact with her family. So, it was that Geoff and Sandra made the move to Lechlade on 5th July 2022, somewhere almost equidistant between Mel, Neil, Alex and Mia at Evesham and their friends in Avening, Tetbury, Minchinhampton area. Sadly, Sandra suffered an aneurism just days after the move to Lechlade, and passed away in her new home on 9thJuly, the ambulance crew in attendance unable to save her.

Sandra's death was a huge shock to Geoff – and of course to the whole family. But Geoff had lost the love of his life, and in some ways, he began to give up on life. He property at Lechlade no longer had appeal or purpose. Of course, Mel and Neil took him into their home and then they converted their garage in Long Marsden into a self-contained room with ensuite for Geoff. Sadly, on 10 February, just after enjoying a roast dinner with Mel and the family, Geoff suffered a heart-attack and never regained consciousness. In many ways, Geoff's death just after that most sociable and regular of family events, the sharing of a meal together, was so appropriate for a man who loved his family and family life. Like his beloved, Sandra, Geoff's life ended unexpectedly and suddenly and at an age too soon – both passing in their 60s – and both now reunited in death.

Pancake Day Race

The 2nd annual village pancake race welcomed a number of families, competing in both child and adult races. Winners of each round took home a medal and all finalists competed for the much-coveted golden frying pan! Well done to Joe Hawker Aged 10, this year's pancake race champion and huge thanks to all those who took part in races, made pancakes, or donated equipment to make this a fun tradition for all who came along.

Children walked through the wall at platform 9 ¾ at the start of the day and were sorted into Gryffindor, Slytherin, Ravenclaw and Hufflepuff houses. 





Royal Visits

(Wing Commander (Ret'd) Roger Lindley confesses all)

When I first joined the RAF, over fifty years ago, Royal visits were taken so seriously that flying operations would come to a grinding halt for days. The focus then was on tarting up the station and numerous parade rehearsals. Fortunately, as years went by a visit by a royal personage would become much less formal.

My first experience was the visit of Princess Margaret to RAF Linton-on-Ouse, a flying training station, in 1971. As the most junior officer on an all-male unit, I was selected to play the part of the Commander-in-Chief's wife at the rehearsals. This meant touring the station with a large sign saying 'Lady Mavor' on my chest. Naturally, the name stuck for the rest of my tour there.

I was indebted to Prince Philip when he visited the maintenance unit at Chilmark in 1975. As the ADC to the Commander-in-Chief, I had already heard the Station Commander's long and boring briefing on the role of the station at the rehearsal, so when Prince Philip responded with *"So you just store bombs here?"* I was struggling not to laugh.

But my come-uppance came when I was running the Administrative Wing at RAF Honington, a Tornado unit, in 1991 at the height of the Gulf War. At a time when the Duchess of York was being criticised for failing to show support for the Gulf effort, I received a call to say that she was coming to visit us in two days' time. Many of our personnel were deployed on operations, so I devised a a programme that predominantly featured the families of those away from home. I did, however, arrange for her to visit one of the squadrons, where they planned to show her around and sit her in a Tornado cockpit.

Unfortunately the Duchess arrived wearing a rather short skirt, so when she clambered into the cockpit all the press cameras went off and *'Fergie's thighs'* were featured in a number of newspapers the next day. We were mortified, but we heard no more about it, and hopefully the Duchess didn't mind too much as it had given her some welcome publicity.

My final meeting with royalty was while serving at the Joint Headquarters at Northwood in 1997.


The then Prince Charles simply came around the offices and had a friendly chat with us all: no parades, no Guards of Honour, no rehearsals. That was more like It!


