Letter From the Parish Priest

In Avening we are fortunate to live in peaceful surroundings, but there are areas of the world where the threat of bomb or bullet in the name of politics or fundamentalist religion, of one sort or another, is a reality. Our age has seen horrendous acts of violence which never cease to dismay or confound us.

The weeks surrounding Remembrance Day remind us again of those who laid down their lives in the vast armed conflicts of the two World Wars, and the more recent conflicts in the hope of a better and more peaceful world. Yet we are perplexed to be inheritors of an even more violent world than previously. We are distressed by the latest wars in Syria and the Middle East and other political tensions that might break into conflict. How do we make sense of it? What is a Christian perspective on it?

First, we have to recognise that terrorism for the evil that it is. The violence and killing that goes on in this way is evil and sinful. No cause justifies this means – no end justifies the violent ways we see being used in so many places in the world to bring about people's political and religious demands. Such wars do not meet the criteria of a 'just war' as expounded by St Thomas Aquinas.

Secondly, such dark times are, in many ways, at the centre of the Christian Faith, not least as we see in the crucifixion of Jesus on the first Good Friday. Here again was the misuse of law using violent means to get rid of an innocent man. Of course it did not rid us of him, but released him through what we call the Resurrection. The Christian Faith maintains that, in the end, evil cannot ultimately succeed – costly loving will eventually win. However, it is costly – so very costly – and we regularly see that cost portrayed upon our television screens.

Thirdly, what does the Faith say? In the long run the only true way to change anything of lasting value is by a change of heart, our individual hearts and the heart of community. That is not at all easy. The call to justice and reconciliation is a tough and demanding challenge for all of us, individually and corporately....

Fourthly, November - the season of Remembrance - starts at the beginning of the month with those who have risen to that challenge. We remember them on the All Saints Day. They are those women and men who have done ordinary things in extraordinary ways. The saints of God are not sugary, pious people but really human, Christ-like people thinking and working beyond themselves and at cost to themselves. Fifthly, the Christian Faith says that this life is not all there is. Of course it is vitally important how we live our lives here and now, but beyond this life, we share in the great communion of saints, the resurrection of Christ and in the glorious presence of God – though what the geography of this is no-one knows! This knowledge should be with us always, but it should never detract from the fact that it is here and now that we are to put Christ's costly love in action and confront evil with that love and the consequences of so loving. In the end, evil men and women can never overcome that love which nothing can destroy.

I am looking forward to my first Remembrance Service in Avening and hope that as many as can join us at the Parish Church for the Remembrance Service on 8th November starting at 10.50 am. We will be there to honour and remember those who laid down their lives for a more hopeful and peaceful world. We must not forget them or the sacrifice they made.

Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



One of the biggest problems of running an organisation as a volunteer is the need to be aware of, understand, and implement the myriad of legal, health and safety, and people requirements required, before you even try to do what you joined for. Some of the people stuff is based on common sense – treat everyone equally; don't say or write anything inappropriate; and listen to everyone's point of view. But what about the legal implications – where committees change, over time, any built up experience can be lost, especially where there is a complete change of membership. Rules and regulations also change over time, so it's very difficult to keep on top of things. However, failing to do so can have huge implications – it could invalidate insurance cover, which could lead to massive problems for the organisation, and a big overhead (both in time and money) to sort everything out.

My concern is that this burden on volunteers is now so great that it will be increasingly difficult to maintain village organisations without professional help. The PC recognised this in the budget review last year, and we now engage experts to help look after the village hall – this model will most likely need to be expanded to other areas where we are ultimately responsible.

I am very fortunate to have gained two new councillors with wide-ranging experience of health & safety, and fire regulations. Added to the other expertise within the team, we are in a good position to bring everything we have responsibility for up to date, and also offer help elsewhere. The downside is that where we are 'turning over stones' and asking questions, a lot of remedial work is being identified – we know the fire precautions in the hall need to be upgraded, and there are also some structural issues that need fixing. This is not a criticism of any previous members of village management committees; it is just that requirements change over time, and an old building always needs love and attention. Bringing things up to scratch will obviously take money to fix, but thankfully we had the foresight to build up our reserves over the last few years, so are able to prioritise this at the moment.

The good news is that we have been able to get the hall infrastructure improvements underway, resolve the legal complications associated with the charitable status (mostly thanks to the clerk's efforts), and appoint a bookings clerk, so when the new hall committee forms (see the meeting details in the PC update later), the members will be able to concentrate on the day to day running and longer term strategy, knowing they have the backup of the PC if they need it.

It was celebration time at school last month when we marked the one year birthday of the school library. It's difficult to believe that it has been a whole year since the builders pulled back the boards and revealed our newly refurbished offices, staff room, learning space and school library. A year on we decided to mark the occasion by having a week of activities in and around the library which included; a poster competition, an open library after school each day and a 'dress up as a book character' day - we had a school full of literary figures from 'Where's Wally' to 'Robin Hood'! The library has not only provided the children with the opportunity to borrow books on a weekly basis but it has also instilled an enthusiasm for reading and enabled children to explore different genres and authors. It is largely thanks to the generosity of our local community and businesses that our library is filled with such an interesting and diverse selection of books. Meanwhile, the KS2 classes were paying visits to their local Tesco's as part of their 'farm to fork' initiative, which is aimed at creating awareness amongst children, explaining where food comes from and how it gets to the shops. Pupils were given a tour of the store, set challenges and given samples of cheeses, breads and fruit to try.

The first half of term ended with the harvest festival where this year the children brought in donations for Stroud Foodbank. Members of the school council will personally deliver the donations later on this month.

To mark the WW1 Centenary, pupils from the Owls Class (Y5/6) have written poems for a special exhibition that is being held at The Comrades Club in Nailsworth on Saturday 7th November. The children will be visiting the exhibition and will meet author and historian Andrew Robertshaw who will talk to them about WW1. The whole school will also be paying their respects at Avening's war memorial, with children reading names from Avening's roll of honour and the School Council placing crosses around the foot of the memorial. Local historian Fred Vening will join the School and organise the playing of the last post.

We now look forward to preparing for this year's Christmas productions. Details of these will be in next months issue......watch this space!

SPANISH

Native Spanish teacher living in Avening

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100 Years Ago September 1915

Loos, France. This was the largest British offensive of 1915 and was an attempt to break away from Trench Warfare. It was the first time that the British had used poisoned gas and it was the first large scale use of British New Army units in battle.

Avening lost two men during the battle, the first being Charles Fletcher (born 1885 in Avening) who died on the first day of the battle - 25th of September. He was a member of the 10th Battalion of the Gloucestershire Regiment for which he had volunteered in November 1914. It is likely that he volunteered following the death of his oldest brother, Fred, who died in October 1914 during the 1st Battle of Ypres. Those of you who read a detailed account of Fred's life will recall that the Fletcher family struggled with living space at home and Charles was also affected. In the 1901 census he was living away from the rest of his family with his Aunt Eliza Ind in her cottage at Woodstock. On her death in 1909, he had to move back to his family in their cottage behind The Bell Inn. Although his mother had died some eight years earlier, they probably found it difficult for all of them, 6 males and one daughter, to fit into 3 rooms!! However, later in 1901, Charles married Alice Hanks in Tetbury and they were blessed with a son, Charles John later in the year. The couple moved to Tetbury Hill and had two further children, Leslie and Hilda.

Our second loss was that of Charles Smith. He was born in 1895 possibly on Old Hill but the death of his father by 1911 had forced his mother to take her two sons to Star Lane. He was unmarried. He followed the call and volunteered for the New Army joining the Grenadier Guards on the 23rd of November 1914. After arriving in France on the 14th of August 1915, his battalion was detailed along with others, to act as a Reserve Force to back up the attack that took place on the 25th of September. That first day of the battle had, in some respects, been a success but Reserves were required to complete the job. Although sent for at the right time, their despatch was delayed and by the time they arrived, the enemy had reorganised and the Reserves, together with the original British attackers were faced with accurate artillery and machine gun fire.

Charles Smith died on the 27th. Neither he, nor Charles Fletcher have known graves and were declared 'Missing'. Both are remembered on the Loos Memorial which lists some 20,000 British men who have no known grave. Both next-of-kin would have received notification of their being declared missing.

This report is a little late but not too late, I hope, for you to raise a glass for these two young men who undoubtedly knew each other, living less than a stones throw apart.

Down to Earth

And so, we made a start on re-ordering the garden for next year and they say that a job well begun is a job half done. Then we turned our backs on it and drove up to North Yorkshire to see some early to mid-eighteenth century landscape gardens. Well, to call them gardens made be stretching the point a little, but to Messrs Aislabie (father and son) and the 3rd Earl of Carlisle at Castle Howard, these were gardens at the very cutting edge of fashion.

To garden historians, Wray Wood, just to the east of John Vanbrugh's splendid Castle Howard, represents a crucial turning point. George London's design had been for straight paths, or rides, radiating from a central point in the woods, in other words, *formality*. The 3rd Earl of Carlisle decided otherwise and devised, in around 1705, a series of *informal* meandering paths, punctuated with statues, seats and temples, to create, in Stephen Switzer's words, 'the highest pitch that Natural and Polite Gardening can possibly ever arrive to.' From this point onwards, Art was used to transform Nature so that Nature itself became Artfully Natural! Wray (or Ray) Wood has now been replanted. Meandering paths remain, though the follies etc have long since vanished.

John Aislabie was the Chancellor of the Exchequer in Robert Walpole's government at the moment in 1720 when the South Sea Bubble burst, and, rather than stay to face the music, he retired to his Yorkshire domain and created a most extraordinary composition of geometric pools, surrounded by

greensward, on a bend in the River Skell, having already turned a section of it into a canal. Reflected in the waters are the trees of the steeply wooded valley slopes and threading through these trees are paths linking temples and seats which allowed surprise views onto the scene below. The grand climax was originally the imposing ruin of Fountains Abbey, although today, unfortunately, the National Trust

oblige the visitor to pass by the abbey *first*. With autumnal tints to the trees and a mistiness in the late afternoon light, it is truly of breath-taking beauty.

John Aislabie's son, William, had, somehow, to surpass this – and did so by creating an experience of the dramatically, awe-inspiring Sublime (or

Picturesque) in his 'garden' at Hackfall, created around 1750. Here the Grewelthorpe brook plunges down a steep wooded valley into the River Ure.

When the visitor has negotiated steep paths and rickety bridges (without plunging self headlong into brook) there are temples and seats and mock Gothic ruins, at which to regain composure - and prepare for the next precipitous stage in the descent. The Hackfall Trust (based in Ripon) was formed in 1988 and any restoration is done with a very light, sensitive touch in order to preserve the atmosphere and natural biodiversity - Hackfall being also a Site of Special Scientific

Interest (SSSI). The Landmark Trust has restored the dual-sided banqueting house for holiday lets; only from inside can the doors be flung open to reveal the dramatic, plunging prospect.

Back in Avening, I was perturbed to see that my Skimmia 'Kew Green' had chlorotic, yellow leaves, indicative of lack of iron. Now, my assistant gardener despairs when I turn to the internet rather than a book. But here's a curious fact: I always *thought* that the skimmia was ericaceous (requiring acid soil). When I potted my newly acquired 'Kew Green', my RHS Encyclopedia of Plants made no mention of ericaceousness. So, I looked on the RHS *online* site: 'soil – acid to neutral'. Ah, so slightly ericaceous, then! I

applied a remedy of a diluted solution of

seaweed extract with sequestered iron. That should restore it to good health!

Butter yellow is also the autumn colour of the *gingko biloba* tree at this time of year, but this is not due to chlorosis. This is a seriously ancient tree, many millions of years old. It is resistant to pollution and indeed a few specimens were the only local living things to survive the Hiroshima atomic bomb in 1945. Look out for it when next you visit Westonbirt.

Screed. Strange stuff! A specialist team prepared our floors with a waterproof membrane, and another thick layer of insulation – all before lunch time. Then we waited... and waited. The lorry finally turned up at 4.00pm, which was just 90 minutes before we had a viewing on our current house. As the liquid was pumped into the lower floor, what seemed like dozens or people flooded



out of the front door – I'm convinced some of them had actually moved in! Within about 30 minutes the job was done, and it actually took much longer to clean the equipment afterwards – but they were away just before our visitors arrived. The product itself is remarkable – a small amount was left over and spread over what will be our drive, and it has set as hard as steel. It's good to know that our floors won't be going anywhere.

The last few weeks have been even more frenetic than usual, and many detailed decisions have been needed – tough on Mandy, as I am away for most of the week. The first fix electrics, plumbing, and plasterboard is mostly complete, and the top skim done on the top floor and master bedroom. We dried it out in double quick time with the aid of an industrial strength dehumidifier, and the painter has already completed the bedrooms and landing. We have also ordered the remaining hardware and ceramics to get the second fix underway.

With the scaffold now down, we can see the rear of the house clearly for the first time – a different perspective to that available to our regular visitors.

The viewing mentioned above has led to a sale, and if everything goes to plan, we will need to move out in the next few weeks. Shaun and the team are working flat out to get as close to completion as possible in time, but we may have to camp out with friends for a couple of weeks. We are still planning to be in for Christmas!

FIRE & RESCUE IRMP 2015-18: Operational Response Review Consultation

In April 2015 Gloucestershire County Council approved the Integrated Risk Management Plan (IRMP) 2015-18 put forward by Gloucestershire Fire and Rescue Service (GFRS). The IRMP outlined three key activities that would be undertaken by the Service in the first year to ensure that planning and resources would be based on risk; these were:

- Fundamental review of operational response
- Development of risk based response targets
- Development of the Demand Management Service Delivery Model

The review of operational response is now complete and the service Strategic Leadership Team agreed on consulting on two proposals:

Proposal 1 - To reduce risk and deliver additional prevention and protection activities in Painswick and the surrounding communities enabling provision of future emergency response from Stroud and close Painswick Fire Station.

Proposal 2 - To change the way in which staff are provided at Cirencester Fire Station to deliver prevention, protection and emergency response using the two fire engines currently based at the station.

Consultation on the proposals began on 1 October 2015 and will run for 90 days during which the views and opinions of all interested parties will be sought.
