#### Bishop Rachel is coming to visit!

On Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> April, The Right Reverend Rachel Treweek will be taking a service for our Benefice for the first time. Our special Benefice service will be held at St Marys' Tetbury, and will bring together all our church families from Avening, Cherington, Long Newnton, Shipton Moyne, Beverston and Tetbury. So do please join us on Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> April at 10am.

Bishop Rachel is, of course, our new Bishop of Gloucester – with her welcoming service held in Gloucester Cathedral in September last year. Although there were two female bishops appointed previously, she is the first woman to be appointed as Bishop of a diocese, rather than as a suffragan bishop. You will have seen her in the news, too, as the first female Bishop to sit in the House of Lords. It will be great to have a chance for everyone to meet her.

#### And Happy Easter!

Happy Easter? No really. One of the things I love about our Easter celebrations is that they last 50 days. That's ten days more than Lent, which always feels right. More time for rejoicing and lots of Alleluias!

I always remember a friend of mine – not a church goer – asking why Christians are so "crazy happy" at Easter. She could understand Christmas … but not Easter. I explained it like this. All of us – at some time in our lives – will be like Mary Magdalen standing by Jesus's grave before sunrise. We will all stand by the grave and weep. We will weep for people we have lost, for dreams and hopes that are shattered, and for relationships that seem broken beyond repair. But then Mary Magdalen turns, and finds Jesus is alive. And in that moment she knows – and we know – that fear, darkness and death will never have the last word. She knows – and we know - that in Christ love and life and light are unconquerable. And that HAS to be good news!

### Peter Rowland and the 14-18 Legacy Project

Peter and his wife Alison have lived in Cherington since 1990 raising both their sons there.

They both worked in education, Peter in the last 12 years of his career as Head Teacher of Severn Vale School in Gloucester. When he left, he had completely transformed what was a failing school into one of the most improved schools in the country, with the percentage of pupils gaining 5 good GCSEs going from 11% to 89%. For this work Peter was awarded a Lifetime Achievement Award in 2014. The Pearson Teaching Awards, attracting over 20,000 nominees, are an annual celebration of exceptional teachers and teaching, founded in

1999 by Lord Puttnam.

Fortunately for education he has not retired - but now has set up his own Educational Consultancy where he works nationally offering these skills and expertise to others working in education.

So how did he get into education? Well this was a rather circuitous route. He really did not enjoy school, preferring the outdoors and so left as soon as he could, joining the Merchant Navy. It was while at sea that he was encouraged to read, and very soon began to devour books, developing a love of literature. He was advised to leave the sea, take A Levels and apply for University. This he did, working as a hospital porter during the day and studying for his A Levels at College in the evenings, before going on to university as a mature student. It was while he was there that he decided to become a teacher, not only a teacher, he wanted to be a Headmaster.

It was interesting talking to Peter about working with young people. We often misjudge youngsters, but Peter's philosophy is to encourage young people to

believe they can do anything. Yes, it requires hard work but it can be done. Inspire them to be aspirational and build their self-belief.

I think all of us can look back on our school days and remember a teacher who inspired us.

What is the 14-18 Legacy? In 2011, Gloucestershire students in a project spearheaded by Peter worked with the Royal British Legion, to raise funds for



the Legion's 90 Year Anniversary. Their target was £90,000. They raised over £75,000 which was an incredible result. But this project was not only about raising money, it was also about helping young people deepen their historical knowledge of war and the sacrifices made for future generations

Peter's next brainchild was to build on this initial work; he called it the 14-18 Legacy. This, now national project, commemorates 100 years since the start of World War 1 and urges schools and young people to get involved in fund raising events to raise £1 million for the British Legion between 2014 -2018. The money raised will help support vital welfare projects such as "Poppy Breaks" for Service children and the British Legion's Battle Back Centre, providing courses to help wounded and injured service members.

The project identifies special dates to remember as it is also about education.

The next important date is the 1<sup>st</sup> of July 2016, the first day of the Battle of the Somme. Schools nationally will be encouraged to mark the occasion and 14-18 Legacy will certainly be planning some key events.

An A - Z of fundraising, both adventurous and enterprising, helps young people develop ways of raising this money. Peter decided that he should support this work and lead by example by taking on these sponsorship

challenges himself. He is now working his way through 26 adventurous activities, one for every letter of the alphabet. He has already completed a triathlon, a half and a full iron man, the Tour de Gloucestershire bike ride as well as a River Dart swim. He has on his list, but is working up the nerve to do them, both a sky dive and wing walking! Looking at the list of 26 potential activities is extremely daunting, but we shall enjoy reviewing his successes over the next couple of years – watch this space for photographic evidence.

### HELEN VALERIE HALLAND

### 1930-2016

Surely a first tribute to Valerie must be that she has brought us together today and that you have travelled to attend this service. Valerie's time amongst us must have triggered a desire to respond to her obvious search for attention. Perhaps her cultured voice also invited the thought that here was a very extraordinary lady!

Valerie was staunchly independent, to such extremes as walking the considerable hills to Nailsworth or Avening and back to Minch! Indeed, in 2007 she swapped Avening for Minch, because she was an enthusiastic member of the Dramatic Society and was finding the rehearsals tough to walk to and from.

When she did attract positive attention we were rewarded by a glorious smile and words of gratitude and when on those few occasions that did not meet her expectations, she did make it very clear that all was not well, but she came round eventually when the situation was made more understandable to her.

When one tries to fathom what Valerie had done during her life there are numerous anecdotes: Could she be one of the missing Russian Princesses? Might she have been related to a Maharajah? Was she presented at court as a debutante? Did she work at the Foreign Office? Had she contacts at GCHQ or Bletchley Park? Was someone interested in writing her memoires? Was MI5 following her?

And was she ever an Avon Lady?

Perhaps a few words about 'on the record' facts concerning Valerie might help.

Her father, Col. Gordon Halland, was a distinguished army officer, who served in India, after WW2 re-established civil policing in West Germany, and was an inspector of the Metropolitan police and DLL of Lincolnshire. He married Helen Claudine Blanche Walter, the daughter of a Major General, in India in 1916. Their first child Claudine was born in 1917 in Simla. Sadly she was severely disabled mentally but lived until 2009.

Helen, Valerie's mother, returned to England in 1927, and died suddenly at St Helier, Jersey in 1946, when Valerie was just 16. Gordon remarried in 1947, his second wife being the Baroness Sigrid von der Recke from Latvia. Both Gordon and Sigrid are buried in in Minch churchyard. Sigrid was a German speaker and possibly spoke Russian as well.

Valerie was born in 1930 and her birth was registered in Portsmouth. In 1940

she was evacuated to Winnipeg, Canada, at the age of 10 and attended Rupert's Land School for Girls, lodging with a family named McDonald, who were friendly with the Hallands. Valerie returned to the UK in 1944. It is said these were the happiest years of her life. She is credited as having been a very good horsewoman and ice skater, perhaps as a result of having been in Canada.

Her family's UK address was in Hampstead and they had celebrated neighbours, including Vita Sackville-West. Thereafter we know nothing of her further education. There is a photo of her taken in 1946 and three postcards from Geneva, Grenoble and Casablanca dated 1958/9, all addressed to Darling Siggy and Daddy, who were then living in Haslemere, Surrey. It is thought she was fluent in French and German and her few belongings included an English/Spanish pocket dictionary. Our verger Colin Brookes worked for her at her livery stable at Benbow Cottage near the Ragged Cot when he was a teenager, probably in the 1960s. It is also known that she was PA to Michael Powell, the world famous film producer, who lived in and is buried in Avening, and she typed up the script for one his most famous films, "Red Shoes".

Valerie attended a Rupert's Land school reunion tea party in London in 2006 and her passport indicates she visited Australia, the USA and Canada in 2002.

Valerie was a great character in Avening where she lived for many years. One day she announced the children of a local charity should learn to swim, so she wanted to build a pool in front of her house. When it was gently pointed out that it might not be very practical, she promptly did a sponsored swim, insisting that Click Mitchell, one of the Trustees, watched and checked every length. She swam for three and a half hours. She would spontaneously cut flowers in her garden, and give them to someone whom she thought unhappy. Her great friends Brian and Molly Woolett emphasise her heart of gold.

Many folk will recall her participation in Minchinhampton Drama Society performances, often swaying in a dance routine out of step with the rest. Also in the library, battling with the computers; driving various cars including an MG, and walking up and down the town wearing those white unlaced trainers beneath a bright red coat. A number of kind friends hosted her 80th birthday party at the Kitchen. She was fortunate that many folk looked after her at times such as Christmas, and local shops and especially the Crown treated her kindly in various ways.

Sadly, there was an incident when she lived at George Pearce Home when she misguidedly dried her wet anorak in the microwave, resulting in charred remains of the garment and fire engines in attendance! Following a short spell at Gloucester Royal Hospital she was assessed, leading to a court protection order that secured her a place at Brookethorpe Hall Care Home in 2012. After a short period of readjustment she was really quite happy there

We enter the world with nothing, and dear Valerie is leaving it with just a hand luggage case, containing a bible given her when she was 16 which we now lay upon her coffin, a prayer book, a book of children's poems bought in Simla, India, a few thrillers; also 'Minchinhampton and Nailsworth Voices' and two old school magazines, a few greeting cards, three soft toys, expired passport and driving licence and a necklace.

### **Down to Earth**

Right now, in the centre of London (at the RA in Piccadilly to be exact,), with only the green escape to Hyde Park in sight, is an exhibition: 'Painting the Modern Garden: Monet to Matisse'. This has been justly acclaimed – and is popular. (Tickets are best booked in advance.) Starting with, and focussing largely on, the Impressionists, the exhibition charts the growing visual appreciation of the garden from the mid nineteenth century onwards with paintings in which flowers shine out like jewels. Check out the little-known German expressionist painter Emil Nolde for his boldly exuberant floral images. I hadn't realised that Monet and fellow-artist, Gustave Caillebotte, were keen and very knowledgeable gardeners, who exchanged information, built their own greenhouses and bred hybrids. The exhibition includes three of the original twelve large panels of Water Lilies, the Agapanthus triptych, on loan from American museums and specially reunited here. Worth a visit, if only to see the poignant willow fronds, Japanese inspired bridge and – ah – those water lilies.



A curiosity in the exhibition was Sir William Nicholson's wonderfully evocative painting of 'Miss Jekvll's Gardening Boots', on loan from the Tate. I always think this says so much about the hard-working, down-to-earth homeliness of Gertrude Jekyll's character. Compare them with the riding boots worn by Vita Sackville West when photographed in her garden. Surely she didn't garden in those? A pose, then. A

statement. Poor Vita ... Dispossessed of her beloved Knole, disorientated in love, yet she transcended loss and confusion to become a distinguished gardener.

I should have known better. Two of the plants I bought most recently were seriously pot-bound. You can lift up the pot, before buying, to see whether roots have escaped from the drainage hole and formed a mat beneath the pot. (Some people do actually turn the plant upside down to check the state of the roots before buying.) With the pulmonaria, it was relatively easy to tease the main roots free from the mat of finer, secondary roots. The lamium, however, presented a dense mat of fine roots. So I did what I once saw a nurseryman do when he took out a pocket-knife and slashed the sides of the root-ball. Sounds brutal, but if you don't, there is the chance that the roots will never venture



outside their own woven cocoon. Now, I am not suggesting that you start slashing roots indiscriminately, but if a plant is pot-bound, you need to do something to *encourage those roots to venture outwards and bed down in the planting hole which you have prepared for it.* 

At last, I have planted a hellebore. As Vita noted in one of her articles for the Observer (1947 - 1961), hellebores, 'are humble, and make few demands. They will put up with a considerable amount of shade, and they do not mind lime.' Perfect, then, for the location I had reserved for it. They are not cheap – but you do not grow rich by running a nursery. And they are very beautiful. Choose

between the helleborus niger (or Christmas rose), the helleborus orientalis (or Lenten rose) or one of the many bred cultivars.

Why, when I am walking in cities, do I see plastic plants in basement areas and shady courtyards? (Too, too ghastly, especially the more realistic ones that seem to smirk and say: 'Nearly fooled you, didn't I!') We had some here,

false ivy, trailing down the wall that looks into our kitchen. Real ivies and ferns, in their wide varieties, can do the job too. The Victorians even brought ferns into their living rooms and parlours in special Wardian cases. So many to choose from (mostly with unpronounceable names), so why don't you investigate some ivies and become a fern fancier



today and brighten up a shady corner!

Now, calling all gardeners, professional or amateur, keen, reluctant or challenged: there will be a plant stall at the Avening Summer Fête on June 12<sup>th</sup>. Can you all nurture some extra seedlings, cuttings or divisions, pot them up, label them and bring along for us sell? All products will be locally grown and prices will be modest.

### **Cherington Parish Council**

#### Cotswold Unitary Bid

Central government is looking to make new devolution deals which should give more power and funding to local government, providing a boost to local economies and communities and giving them more say on how public services are delivered.

On 25<sup>th</sup> February Cotswold District Council revealed its proposal to consider creating a new unitary authority based on existing boundaries of Cotswold and West Oxfordshire District Councils which would form part of Oxfordshire's reorganisation and devolution deal. This is part of the plan called 'Oxfordshire Vision'. (CDC is keen to point out this would not mean that the current CDC area within Gloucestershire would form part of the county of Oxfordshire). The 'Leadership Gloucestershire' group, with the exception of Cotswold District Council, is opposing this plan and is disappointed that CDC has chosen to be part of the Oxfordshire devolution proposal. Leadership Gloucestershire has put forward a joint bid for a county-wide devolution deal.

Any proposals have to be given time for the public to comment and a public consultation is likely to take place this summer. Cotswold District Council is planning on engaging consultants to carry out a feasibility study in April on the new proposals.
