Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



Cable Laying: You won't have missed the team who have been laying fibre optic cables – we are the first village in the Cotswolds to get this infrastructure, and we will soon have the option to be connected to super-fast broadband. Unfortunately, the communication has been very poor, with only badly phrased and frightening letters sent to a few households. **We have arranged a public meeting on 4th March in the hall at 7.30** to discuss matters with the management of the company involved – all welcome.

Snow: Hopefully the snow is now over for the winter, but the early February dump gave me some food for thought, and some interesting photo opportunities (see later in the magazine). There was some good cooperation to clear some local roads, but others became very dangerous as the melting snow froze. It's a shame our wheeled gritter was only lightly used, as it makes clearance a breeze, and conserves valuable grit. We have also identified the need for an additional grit bin at the top of Star Lane. Most amusing was the use of Sandford Leaze as a sledging run (before the grit kicked in) – it was like a busy alpine piste!

Dog Poo: I'm afraid I have to give another airing for dog poo! It's becoming a problem in the playing field again, and a new front has opened on the east along the lane through to Nags Head — unbelievably, people are going to the trouble of bagging it up, but then chucking the bag in the verge! We're commissioning a new bin at the crossroads in Nags Head, so there will be no excuse.

Footpaths: I've had a few reports of issues relating to access along footpaths – some paths have been blocked, leaving no style or opening gate, and there have been a couple of occasions where walkers have been challenged while walking perfectly responsibly along a formal path. Most recently (and worryingly) a deer was shot with a rifle on a path close to the village, and the carcass dumped in the hedge. Landowners, please ensure all your paths are passable (ideally with dog access), allow people unfettered access along them, and hunt away from areas of population.

Playing Field: It's a year since we faced the 'angry mob' over our ambitious but misunderstood plans for the field, but we have listened to public feedback. We appreciate there is no appetite for organised sport, and we have since focussed on safety improvements and enhancing the existing facilities. In the May Villager we will publish full details, and we plan to get to as many local groups as we can in April/May, with a display at the annual Village Meeting on 18th May.

Precept: We managed to make some good savings in the last financial year despite continued investment in the hall, and organising a series of successful

events. The next year will focus on our two big projects — the replacement of the hall roof, and improvements to the playing field. We hope to fund these with as much external funding as possible, but have budgeted for the preliminary works within current balances. You will see a small increase in the village precept but that just keeps pace with inflation, and is the equivalent of a couple of pounds in a year for the average household.

Villager of the Year: As mentioned above, the Annual Village Meeting (or outdoor party!) will be on Saturday May 18th, so mark it in your diary. One of the most important features is the Villager of the Year award – this is your opportunity to nominate anyone who you think has contributed significantly to village life in the last year (or longer). We're also looking for junior and student nominations for our younger residents. Please let me, the clerk, or any councillor know your nominations as soon as possible, but by 5th April latest.

A Thank You to Avening.



Despite my parents getting married and settling in North Woodchester, Avening was always a pull to my family. We used to joke that the car knew its own way around the Avening bends as Dad drove daily to see his mother and check on the Social Club. It did not come as a surprise then that Dad persuaded Mum to permanently become an Avening resident 30 years ago.

Still tending his Mother's large garden, it was here that they put down their own roots in the orchard, designing their own dream house together. I remember being taken around a muddy patch as Mum eagerly explained the layout of their house to be, complete with a large fireplace in the living room. In later days it was great to hear them arguing over lighting the fire as Dad hated the lingering smell of smoke afterwards.

Mum was soon welcomed into village life, helping the Playgroup and at the Village Fete, and the journey to the Post Office or shop always took longer than it should as there was always someone to stop chat to and pass the time of day with.

It did not take long for Mum to be accepted as an Avening resident. My sister and I joked she was busier in her retirement than she had been in her working life. When we called she was volunteering at Longfields shop, swimming with friends, getting WI, Flower Arranging or Trefoil Guild stuff ready, if not down the Club or making cricket teas. Later on, there were practices and events with the Stuart Singers. During this time she was also helping others who were nearing the ends of their lives and helping with trips to the hospital — a bit ironic that

she never knew how precious little time she herself would have....

Mum's last few weeks became rather a fast action blur to me. In just a few short weeks, we gathered around to say our last goodbye. During these last few weeks we have been surrounded by the care of the village, from sympathy cards (I'm sure the Postman stood for about five minutes posting at least thirty cards on one day) to visitors and phone calls. The WI and members of The Social Club swung into action and organised us well!

I was overwhelmed by the hundreds of people who came to the funeral, filling it to bursting point. I would like to thank everyone I did not get round to see. It is comforting to know that as I travel up and down from Reading, there are so many wonderful people who will continue to look out for Dad.

Avening is a proud, village community with a great spirit, where people know and look out for each other. I only wish that my own village could become like this as I don't even know half of my neighbours!

Thank you, Avening, for your support.

We are all feeling the very sad loss of Eileen Ind, one of our committee members. Eileen joined Avening WI in 2010 and soon became active on the committee, first as secretary and then in charge of our 'Bite to Eat' catering activities. Her kind, calm and organised manner ensured the success of all the events undertaken. She will be sorely missed and we will try to follow her example and to continue to provide the service as required.

Our speaker for February was Richard Burton who regaled us with some very amusing anecdotes of his life as a salesman in various department stores. He

was brought up on the Barrington Court estate in Somerset where his father was gardener, but decided that a job on the land was not for him. He had been impressed in his young days by various salesmen, including a Sikh gentleman who arrived with suitcases and set out his fine linens on the lawns outside the workers' cottages, and so decided that a career in sales was what he would like to do. He secured a job in a local department store and started in the carpet and linoleum department, shadowing one of the experienced salesmen until the day came when he was allowed to make a sale of some carpet webbing! His tales illustrated how different the retail experience was in the 1960s.

Our next Fun Quiz, run by the amazing Shirley Hand, will take place on Friday 5th April with a 7.30pm start at the Social Club. This is always a popular village event and everyone is welcome. 



Riley Reminisces In The Desert

Continuing Riley's war time memories:

Our draft had now moved to Amiraya in Egypt. Christmas 1941 had come and gone and we had a new identity. We were now to be known as 59 R.S.U. (Repair and Salvage Unit) of the R.A.F. Our Lords and Masters decided a nucleus of Base Camps with two salvage detachments to fulfil the salvage obligations (mainly crashed aircraft in the desert). Imagine, here we were with sand as far as one could see, and our detachment was ordered to collect gum boots, blankets and straw palliases!

A major emergency had erupted: it was policy for the R.A.F. to make use of the large salt flats in the region as landing strips, but that winter Egypt had an extraordinary amount of rainfall. Consequently, the surface of the flats became unable to support the weight of a number of Bristol Beauforts and despite all previous attempts to free them by mechanical means the aircraft were stuck and the surface became churned up to a deep mud which added to the possibility of losing them completely. Brute force and ignorance became the order of the day, which meant us laying a track of heavy boards. To reduce the weight, we were ordered to remove the wing assemblies and after numerous attempts we succeeded in raising the aircraft and positioning the board sunder the two main wheels. We could now move the aircraft the lengths of the boards and by placing similar boards one in front of the other, eventually moved the aircraft to harder ground.

Working 12 hour shifts with our sister R.S.U's (51 and 53), we accomplished our task. It took six men to reposition the boards as they were very heavy kit. It was then decided as we freed each aircraft it was to be towed (minus the mainplanes) through the streets of Alexandria to Abukir, for reassembly of the mainplanes, flight testing and return to the relative squadrons.

It all ended satisfactorily. 59 R.S.U. had been 'blooded' and we found our way back to our various units to roam the desert and salvage the many aircraft which had force-landed or otherwise. So after returning the mud-stuck planes, we made our way back to our Unit which we located at Mersa Matruh and reported "IN", glad to be rid of our gumboots! We then pitched our single bivouacs, dug a slit trench and awaited the nightly blitz which was not long in coming, but was definitely unnerving.

Approximately 24 hours later, equipped with a three-ton lorry and survival equipment, a Queen Mary trailer (specialised to carry aircraft), a Coles crane

and most important, a compass (our sole means of navigation), we set off to trace our first downed aircraft.

Our only information was the pilot's last transmission (degrees N, degrees E etc). From a distance our Coles crane must have looked like a large gun, so we received our share of enemy action, but luckily we lost nobody. We were also close to the coast road so we came to expect a sneaky raid from the sea at any time and having no protection, one's ears were one's aircraft identifiers. In the evenings we would pitch our bivouacs well away from the unserviceable aircraft. Such was our life in the desert for the next two and a half years.





Avening Parish Council



The minutes of the meeting on 21st February will be published shortly, but some of the items discussed are summarised below:

Crime

One 'violent communication' was reported in January. The Police were unable to provide more detail.

Fibre Optic Cable Laying

Gigaclear have agreed to attend a public meeting on 4th March at 7.30 in the hall to address residents' concerns regarding the laying of fibre optic cables.

We are hoping that the Surveyor and a representative from the installers will be in attendance along with Cllr Hirst from GCC.

Memorial Hall

The roof project continues. We are liaising with the conservation officer as to the type of roof tile that can be used, and seeking more detailed estimates to complete the work – it is hoped that only the North elevation will need to be replaced.

Playing Field

Another special meeting of Parish Councillors was held to confirm the priorities proposed for the reduced scheme, and to set out the ways forward. Minor works previously identified will be implemented at the earliest opportunity, with priorities being:

- Fencing with matching gates around the existing play area;
- Improvements to disabled access to the playing field from Sunground,
 and connection to the cycle track;
- Drop kerbs around the Sunground entrance;
- Improvement to the perimeter footpath/cycle track around the playing field;
- Upgrade the playground with additional equipment with attendant maintenance and management;
- Level the main informal grass playing field to make it safe and useable for all activities;

This will enable retention of the informal North West corner of the site to conserve its flora and fauna, and retain the slope for sledging in snowy weather.

Defibrillator

A second Defibrillator will be installed in the old phone box at the junction of

Old Hill/Lawrence Road.

Recycling

Cllr Morgan of Cotswold District Council reported that all households will be provided with a separate food waste bin and that textiles, small electronics, and tetra packs will in future be part of the kerbside recycling. Green bins will be collected fortnightly for a trial period from September.

Dog Fouling

Following a complain of dog fouling at Nags Head, a new dog waste bin will be installed.


