Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



Regular readers may recall that in January last year I announced my intention to stand down as PC chairman at the AGM, but almost immediately afterwards the world fell apart – we couldn't meet at all initially and were advised not to schedule an AGM, and in any case it wouldn't have been right to hand over to someone new during those circumstances.

However, we made it through and as we are fast approaching some sort of exit from the Covid carnage, we are now able to host the AGM on 5th May via zoom – please note the April and May PC meeting will be merged and will also take place on 5th May. It is now a much more appropriate time to hand over the reins to a new leader to carry on the work we have started, but who can do so with their own new ideas. If all goes to plan this will be my penultimate update to you as chairman.

At the hall AGM the committee successfully elected a leader, Bob Scurfield, and Treasurer, Sarah Champion – I wish them every success in their new roles, and with the rest of the enthusiastic committee ready for action I am sure they will be able to make the hall a welcoming and safe space for all users as soon as it can be reopened.

We received our batch of mixed native saplings and these have now been planted in various areas mostly around the playing field. Many thanks to the volunteers: Alan Watson, Sandra and John Hetterly, Cas Boddam-Whetham, Mike Metcalf, Bill and Julia Tu, Pete Barton, and Christine Howell.

Still no update from the Environment Agency regarding the new dam and earthworks at Aston Farm, but I continue to chase them. CDC planners seem to be waiting for the EA, but they did say the estate disagrees with the EA findings. The stream is already quite low for the time of year, and I'm confident it will reduce to a trickle in the summer unless restorative work is completed.

Cllr Mulligan and I had a good meeting with the Highways manager where we reviewed many of our road hotspots. Some immediate actions were agreed, and longer-term projects added to the list for action – as always money is the limiting factor and some of these works may not proceed until the 2022/23 financial year, but we will continue to liaise with Highways and our County Councillor to progress the improvements and repairs as soon as possible. Highways have also agreed to install additional signage from The Triangle towards Westend to help combat speeding vehicles in that area.

There was a win for us with the new properties to be built by the Playgroup – with the help of our District Councillor Richard Morgan, we persuaded CDC to incorporate some green technologies into their designs. These homes will be prioritised for Avening people, so to ensure we benefit it is important to register your interest ASAP. To do so go to the GRCC website – I have placed the full link on our home page, and we will provide more information in the coming months.

We have some lovely people in the village, and the community spirit is growing. Mike Metcalf has been busily digging Jim Hill's veg patch so that Jim will find it easier to plant

his potential produce. There are a growing number of 'Wombles' collecting litter – Lynne Adams belongs to a local group of collectors, and Amanda and Ellie Sanders can often be seen with pickers and bags in hand. The spring litter pick has taken place, and was organised by Pete Barton. Several people including Mandy Slater pick up other people's dog poo (still at unprecedented levels in the field and church yard!), and John Partridge has cleared the many deliberately discarded bags up the MacMillan Way. Thanks to them all - but would the person/people who actively fills the bags and then just leaves them under a tree please use the bin that is no more than 100 yards away!!

April will see the final edition of The Buzz – Clare Bebbington, the team, and contributors have kept us entertained through the long winter months with their upbeat stories and features when we couldn't meet at the Café or even outside. We should soon again be able to join 'rule of 6' outdoor cafés so do contact the team if you can host one or would like to attend – it's great for meeting new people (and for having a mooch around other people's gardens). The Café committee have done a brilliant job in keeping our spirits up!

The big budget film production at the church has now finished, and other than a couple of gripes I think most people really enjoyed the attention in our village and were interested in the process. I can't wait to see us on screen, and perhaps we could have a 'Premiere' in the hall when it's complete?

Mothering Sunday

... an excellent day to resume our live services, which were held in our churchyards. It was good to see so many people at both churches as we remembered our mothers (and fathers) as well as those families where the relationships between parents and children have not been ideal or even non-existent. Thank you to all those who came and especially to those who prepared the gifts of flowers which were given out to mums and the delicious simnel cake – not to mention the colourful decoration to the Avening church gate. We were also privileged to hear a reflection from Rachel, the Bishop of Gloucester, which she had recorded especially for our parishes: we are most grateful to her.

A different view of the Chancel of Avening Church

As was mentioned in the March Villager, the church council has been discussing the use of the chancel area of Avening church – that is the part between the tower and the main altar. In recent weeks the Archdeacon has given a temporary licence (15 months) for the pews which were in the chancel to be moved elsewhere in the church so that more varied ways of using the space can be explored. With the help of many volunteers this move has now taken place and the chancel has been restored to its

previous state (pre 1900) as an open space with the original walls and floor revealed. When services inside the church resume this area will be used for some of them, using the wooden chairs already in the church. If you have any thoughts on this change then the Churchwardens or myself would be very pleased to hear from you. At the moment the church is open on Wednesdays from 9 to 3pm.

Filming at Avening Church

During the week beginning 15th March the church and churchyard were used as sets for scenes in a film entitled "Becoming Elizabeth" which deals the period before Elizabeth I became Queen. Within a couple of days the church was transformed by the scenery team with ingenious ways of disguising items such as heating pipes and radiators: false walls appeared as did a cobbled floor. The film is being produced by an American company but it is hoped that it will eventually be available in this country. The two filming days were especially hectic with so many actors, support staff and even horses. We hope all this activity did not cause too much inconvenience to you. (pictures on page 15)

Thank you to all those who helped to prepare the church beforehand and to those who acted as stewards during the week – another example of Avening's community spirit.

Easter – is it More Than Eggs?

I am increasingly aware of the varied images that people have of 'God'. These include the 'super-person in the sky' constantly watching out for our misdeeds; the resentful and vengeful one trying to trip us up; the distant one who doesn't have much time for ordinary folk like us; the one whose main concern is who we share our bed with. Do any of these overlap with your impressions? Or perhaps the whole idea of 'God' is far removed from anything that makes any sense for you.

Well, those images above don't make any sense to me either. What a travesty that they have been perpetrated through much of Christian history and still remain so prominent.



The Easter story gives us a much more realistic and positive approach to meditating on the nature of the divine – although we must accept at the outset that our human perspective can only be very limited: rather like quantum theory and my golf, if you think you've got it gripped then you certainly haven't. On Good Friday we see some of the tragic depths to which humanity can fall: people murdered in a most gruesome and public fashion and, in one case at least, a person who had dedicated much of their life to bringing care, love and healing to those around him. At the heart of

the Christian faith is the feeling that God was there sharing that pain and utter humiliation – but not only then, also with us when we are at the lowest points of life. The resurrection stories show the bigger picture that, out of the worst, can come the best. We are a part of that story, living with a God whose intention is to be with us and to bring us, in life and death, to become our true selves. On Easter morning the tomb is empty but the spirit of the one who was laid there is alive within us.

Some biblical insights: Jesus said: *I have come that they may have life, and have it to the full.* (John 10:10)

God is love. Whoever lives in love lives in God and God in them. (1 John 4:16)

What are your thoughts? I am always happy to hear from you.






Farm Life



As we move into the start of spring, our focus turns to our plans for the coming year and what we need to do before the growing season starts.

I've mentioned a few times that our farm is made up of predominantly permanent pasture, which has been in situ for well over 60 years and in some fields even longer. As well as this, our recently planted herbal leys provide a variety of grazing options for the year. This will consist of mob-grazing, where the cattle are moved every few days to strip-grazing, where the cattle are given a new

'strip' every day. Set stocking is another option and is the most traditional method of grazing, where very simply, the cattle are put into a field and removed when the grass has been eaten down. Although this is the easiest method, it definitely isn't the most productive and is reserved for the older parkland pastures where either electric fencing is unsightly or impractical.

We have to make a decision as to where the cattle will graze in the summer and Dad and I have lengthy discussions to work this out. Around half of the farm will be used for either hay or silage production to give us enough feed for the winter. So as soon as the fields are dry enough we aim to remove all of the cattle to fields which are less favourable for hay-making and more suited to grazing, which tend to be on the banks of the Avening valley. The absence of cattle allows the fields to be worked on in preparation of growing as much grass as we can. The composted manure left by the cows will be chain harrowed; this also pulls dead grass from the sward and allows the new grass to grow in its place. We also roll the field to push the roots of the grass back into the soil for better root to soil contact. Rolling also reduces the potential for the contamination of soil getting into the hay or silage that can cause an illness called listeriosis in cattle. Any grass churned up through the winter by the cattle will also be repaired at this time of year by over sowing the bare patches with new grass seed. After all of these jobs have been carried out, the fields are then 'shut up'. This now means that they are then taken out of the grazing regime and are left empty and untouched to allow Mother Nature to do her best and grow a good crop of grass.



Our herd will be put into three groups for the coming spring and summer, the split based on a different type of grazing for each.

Our commercial cattle will be grazed on the newly established herbal ley, by either mob or strip-grazing. This will increase daily live-weight gains and also help to manage the ley.

Our rare-breed herd of Gloucester cattle will graze the more traditional pastures by 'set stocking' as the breed lends itself to this type of traditional grazing. They will then come back up to fields nearer the farm yard for calving in July!

The last group is our youngest group made up of the calves currently in our livestock shed. These will be let out into a small paddock for the first few months. As they have not yet been out at grass, it's always a bit nerve-wracking on turn-out day as they have absolutely no concept of fences, meaning we often end up having to chase the odd one or two that have ran straight through it!

It's always remarkable how an animal's natural instinct kicks in straight away and after a few laps around the field they find a source of water and put their head down to enjoy the first taste of grass. These will progress onto the mob-grazing system later in life.

Like all farmers at the moment, we are 'chomping at the bit' for the weather to get warmer and the fields to dry. As they say "preparation is key"!

Avening School

Together Again!

How wonderful it is to have our whole school back together again. After three months of remote learning for many of our pupils, the sheer joy at everyone being together in their classroom bubbles is immeasurable. In beautiful echo to the children returning, we had eggs supplied to the school in incubation by 'Living Egg', which hatched just prior to the re-opening at the beginning of March. The children who were in school at the time of the hatchings were then responsible for the care of the chicks which were a welcome addition to the class bubbles when they were reunited and provided great excitement and joy at a time when it was needed most.

In order to reflect on how families and pupils found remote learning, a parent survey was sent out to parents towards the end of February. The answers and comments that came from the survey enabled school to look at what worked and what could be improved, if needed again in the future. Overall, the findings were very positive and reflect the excellent job that not only school staff, but also parents have done to keep their children's education going over the lockdown period. The fact that the children at home were learning and making progress during this incredibly challenging time could not have happened without the input of parents in the background ensuring that the children were organised and supporting learning in so many ways. They really are the unsung heroes of the moment and deserve national recognition.

This year, we moved our World Book Day celebrations back a week, when the children were all back in and held a 'happiness day' in school. Focusing on why, how and which books make us happy, children came in dressed in whatever makes them happy; we had princesses, army cadets, dogs, sports kits and sparkly dresses to name but a few. We also had a visit from travelling storyteller Bill Church who delighted the children with his tales from around the world and each child made a blossom for our happiness tree displayed in school. Staff also uploaded recordings of them reading from books that they enjoy onto Teams for all children to access at home, replacing our annual bedtime story session. Unable to provide refreshments in person as they do each year, our fabulous FOAS team provided each child with a pack containing a sachet of hot chocolate and a biscuit so that they didn't miss out.

On top of all the excitement at being a complete school community once again, we have had Hollywood come to Avening this week. Filming for a television series has been happening in and around Avening church, which has been a source of great fascination for the children and staff. On the first day of filming, KS2 children stood outside in their bubbles and watched some of the filming as well as speaking to some of the cast and the Assistant Director who answered questions from the Owls pupils.


