



Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



If all goes to plan this should be the final article that I write to you as chairman (although I might be permitted by the editors to sign off in the June edition). The AGM is on 5th May where a new leader will be elected – the meeting is open to everyone, as is the usual PC meeting that follows it. Both meetings will have an opportunity for public questions – agendas will be published on the website and notice boards, and will include a link into the Zoom virtual meeting. We anticipate this will be the final virtual meeting, but we await confirmation that we can start face to face meetings again from June.

Following the death of Prince Philip, I sent a card to our neighbour the Princess Royal to express our sympathy and condolences on behalf of the parish and the PC. On the Sunday after Prince Philip's death, and in the lead up to the funeral our church bells were rung by the Bell ringing teams.* The half-muffled ring struck a sombre tone but summed up a lot of the nation's feelings while remembering the Prince and his legacy. The funeral was very moving and highlighted the anguish so many families must have endured through the pandemic, in not being able to comfort loved ones or include everyone that would have attended a service under normal circumstances. This was also evidenced recently with the passing of Jim Townsend, but many people in the village were able to wish Jim well on his final journey by lining the High Street as he passed.

You will see details later in the magazine that we are entering the final push to secure funding for the replacement zip wire. The administration at CDC have imposed an over complicated process for parish councils wishing to apply for grant funding, so we have had to register for another crowd funding exercise. Please help us out by following the guide provided in John's article so that we can complete the installation ASAP.

It's only April and our stream is already worryingly low. This hasn't been helped by the unusually dry weather, but with valuable water leaking from the new channel dug at Aston Farm I have written to our friends in Cherington PC to ask if they can help. They have previously indicated that they prefer a direct personal approach to resolve issues, so without any progress from the Environment Agency or CDC I am hoping they can help.

To Jim family always came first. He was a loving husband to Vi, Dad to Pete, Bomber and Mark. Father-in-Law to Tracey, Kate and Clare. Gramp to Carly, Chloe, Arron, Jayme, Beth and Amelie and Great-Gramp to Max, Lauren, Carter and Hallam. We were so proud to call him ours and to have had the experience of loving and being loved by someone who always embodied family first with strength, dignity and honour was truly an incredible privilege.

Jim and Vi's love story began in the Club at Nailsworth where they were both learning to dance. Jim was living in Rectory Lane and Vi was living in Harley Wood. They later got married in Nailsworth Parish Church on the 30th March 1957. They purchased their beloved home 30, High Street, Avening but they had to live in a caravan for a year whilst they waited for the previous owner to move out! Their first son Pete was born in September 1959. Bomber was born in March 1962 and finally they completed their family with the arrival of Mark in May 1969.

They lived a contented life, with their boys enjoying a happy childhood filled with love and laughter.

Later as the boys grew up Jim changed his job as often as he changed his car. They had their share of hard times but together they got through.

Jim was a very funny man – we laughed with him often. He had the ability to tell a story knowing we would laugh but not laugh himself.

Jim was also well known for his one liners. If he brought a new car that was a brammer on the first night, by the second night – say when the car had no first gear... it was a pup.

If the boys would misbehave he would tell them he would chuck them out of the window!! Much to Violet's dismay.

If something would annoy him it would be... "Well, I go to Stroud".

There are few things we have realised about Jim over the last couple of weeks –

- How many people knew you (and loved you!!)
- How hard it was to keep a strong man down...
- How many cars, jobs and shoes can one man have??!

When Jim went to hospital just after Christmas it was the longest he had ever been away from Avening. Pete and Bomber would speak to him every day and it was very clear he just wanted to come home.

With the arrangements made Jim came home on 14th February. We had several incredible weeks catching up with him before he became too unwell.

Jim passed away peacefully at home on April 8th 2021 – fulfilling his last wish.

We all love and miss you Jim.

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
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Avening Church – Past, Present And Future

If you have been into the church recently when it has been open on Wednesdays you may have noticed it looking a little different. The recent use of the church as a film set required nearly all the usual furniture to be moved out of the way. After the filming we saw most of the areas of the church as empty spaces and this is now an encouragement to consider which items should be placed where,

without assuming that their previous positions were necessarily the most appropriate ones for current times. This can be a matter of balancing aesthetic appearances, historical significance and practicalities of worship and church usage. The building is a community asset whose use has included talks, concerts and dances: there may well be other imaginative uses of the building in the future.

At the time of writing most of the wooden chairs have been placed in the chancel and nave with some remaining in the Brydges Chapel: this may avoid the need to have stacked chairs at various points around the church. The choir pews which were in the chancel are now at the back of the nave and Brydges Chapel.

Further experimental moves will be made over the next few weeks. As in many older buildings, items are acquired over the years, once serving a good purpose and later ceasing to do so as practices and viewpoints change. If they are retained then it is reasonable to ask questions such as: do they inhibit the appearance and use of the building?; what 'message' about church life do they convey?; what is the value of keeping them? It may well be that this applies to some of the items in the church. The permanent removal of any significant item requires consultation and permission from the Diocesan authorities, so there are safeguards against random disappearances!

Your observations about this would be welcome even if you are not a regular member of the congregation. If you have any thoughts then the Churchwardens or myself would be very pleased to hear from you.




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




Avening School

Music and Nature

As the school garden bursts into life with colour and activity, the whole school will be using it to support their learning on the natural world. This term, the KS1 Eagles (R/y1) and Kestrels (y1/2) will be delving into nature in their topic 'Dens and Dandelions'. The Hawks (y3/4), will also be exploring living things and their natural habitats, while the Owls class (y5/6) will be focusing on the environment in their term topic 'We are the future'.

There will be two very different sets of visitors to the classrooms this term with the Kestrels, Hawks and Owls receiving a special delivery of caterpillars, while the Eagles will host several eggs and an incubator in their classroom. The caterpillars will be observed by the classes as they watch them grow and develop as they turn into butterflies. Similarly, the Eagles will observe the eggs and, hopefully, witness the magic of the chicks hatching.



As always, the school garden continues to play a vital part in our daily learning and thanks to an incredibly generous donation, we are able to have the bridge across the stream replaced, ensuring the safety of all who use it. Another improvement that happened during the holidays was the re-painting of the Owls Classroom, which meant the Owls returned to a sparkling, fresh classroom after the Easter break.

With day trips being permitted again, we have dates in the diary for outings in the local area and depending on national

guidance, a residential trip to Copsegrove Farm for the Owls class later on in the term.

The school will be alive with the sound of music during the next few weeks as the Owls class embark on viola lessons. They will also be joined by the Hawks class for a brass demonstration session organised by Brass Bands England. With clubs being allowed again, our school brass band club can also resume practice.

Our incredible FOAS team have recently held their AGM and are currently organising a COVID-safe Bear Hunt around Avening for the weekend of 15 May. The Bell Inn, Avening

In recent editions of The Villager there have been some articles about pubs in the village which prompted me to look at old paperwork that had belonged to my late Father Sidney Tanner. He became landlord of the Bell Inn in 1953. At that time, The Bell was only a beer and cider house, it stayed that way until another pub closed in the village, (I believe The New Inn), only then did The Bell become fully licensed and able to sell spirits too.



The agreement paperwork with Stroud Brewery shows that the rent was £30 per annum with an additional £6 per annum for the orchard, now known as Orchard Field. This area of land was 27 perches in size and in those days the orchard was known as The Brassingtons. We had no use for the orchard but customers did and they used it for grazing horses, goats and my Mother, Nellie Tanner kept some chickens. In those days my Father was church warden and in later years a section of the orchard was bought to extend the burial ground at the Holy Cross church.

My Mother played an active part in village life, she was a member of the church choir, Mothers Union and the highlight being a trip to the Royal Albert Hall to carry the Royal British Legion standard at The Service of Remembrance.

The Bell played a crucial part in village life during the 1950's and 60's, it was more than a place just to have a drink, it offered a number of services to the villagers. A large jar stood on the shelf behind the bar, it was in this jar that customers placed their football coupons, and payments. These were collected every Saturday morning by the local Littlewoods Pools agent.

A reporter called in every Monday morning from the Stroud News to collect details left by customers of anything they wanted to be printed in the paper. In those days there used to be 2 local Stroud papers, The Stroud News and The Stroud Journal, they amalgamated in 1957 to become The Stroud News and Journal.

On Wednesdays, the laundry van arrived to collect and return customers items. We also had deliveries from Hillier's twice a week, they delivered pork pies which were sold over the bar and sausages or ham which customers could order to take home. A butcher also delivered meats and a fishmonger delivered every Friday. My Mum used to keep these deliveries cool in the cellar until customers collected them.

So, while many of us still enjoy a trip to The Bell, you can see that it has been a central hub in the village for many, many years.

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As the months move on, the date our rare-breed Gloucester cows are due to calf becomes closer. After pregnancy scanning, we were able to age the unborn calf to determine which artificial insemination bull or our own bull 'Jimmy' is the calves sire. This procedure is now so high-tech both Dad and I were able to see an ultrasound scan of the fetus! This is not something that would usually be carried out so much in a commercial herd, but due to the rare-breed status, the provenance of each bull is important to the breed as a whole. We were very pleased to find out that one of the Gloucesters is carrying a calf sired by an AI bull which was alive in the 1970s! This means that the calf produced will be of significant value to the breed as it will increase the gene pool and could provide an option for other Gloucester cattle farmers to use on their herds if it is a male calf.

As we haven't had any breeding cows on the farm for a long time, I have recently refreshed my knowledge on caring for cows during pregnancy. Fortunately, through my father and grandfather's knowledge of the land, I became aware that our farm is deficient in the trace element 'selenium'. Selenium deficiency can have an impact on an unborn calf and has the potential to cause a number of problems; most commonly the calf is born extremely weak with very stiff muscles and the inability to stand. Selenium is a chemical element found naturally in the soil and where the quantity is low, plants such as grass can also suffer from a low concentration. This deficiency can be passed to the unborn calf if its mother does not absorb a sufficient amount in her diet through grazing or hay. As the cow reaches her later stages of pregnancy, as with our Gloucesters, they will start to build up a supply of nutrients to the calf in the form of her first milk called 'colostrum'. It's here, along with other minerals and vitamins, that selenium is concentrated into the milk, and as such is important to include extra selenium into the cows diet in the run up to calving on farms known to be deficient. For us, the most practical way of doing this is in the form of mineral buckets that also provide a number of other trace elements, vitamins and minerals that will aid in the development of the un-born calf.



During the winter, the Gloucesters were fed just hay; this was so that the cow didn't increase her body fat cover. The more fat cover, the harder it is for them to give birth without human intervention. Now that they are in the later stages of pregnancy, a higher quality feed called haylage will be fed as it has a higher nutritional value. This again has the same objective in ensuring the cow can provide its calf with the correct nutrients it needs to develop and also for her to produce enough of the all important colostrum when the calf is born.

The girls will be moved onto their summer grazing down in the valley for a few weeks before coming back up to the farm for calving.

A Brief History of Lawn Bowls and the Link to the Stroud Area

Join your local club ..NAILSWORTH MILLS BOWLS CLUB FOUNDED IN 1900

Bowls is a popular British pastime with a long and colourful history. From humble beginnings, it survived a royal ban to become a sport played in over 50 countries around the world.

Historians have traced the sport of bowls all the way back to the 13th century. Several manuscripts of the period were found to include drawings of people playing bowls, or at least a rudimentary version of it. The world's oldest surviving Bowling Green is the Southampton Old Bowling Green, which was first played on in 1299.

Both the British Royal Family and Parliament became concerned that the growing popularity of bowls would stop people practising archery, which was an important skill for battle. It was forbidden in the reigns of Edward III, Richard II and other monarchs. The prohibition even continued after the invention of gunpowder and firearms.

Bowling alleys had first been established in London in 1455 and were regular spots for the dissolute and criminals.

King Henry VIII was a lawn bowler but he also banned the game in 1511 for labourers, servants and people of a similar social standing, although they could still play on Christmas Day. The word 'bowls' was actually used for the first time in this statute. The ban was lifted following his death in 1547.

The invention of the lawn mower by Edwin Budding of Thrupp, near Stroud, in 1830 is strongly believed to have sparked the creation of bowling greens, even though the mower was originally invented for the cutting of the 'nap' on the woollen cloth, (as can be seen in the Stroud Museum). This in turn led to the codification and the rules of lawn bowls, as well as other sports such as football and lawn tennis.

In 1864 William Wallace Mitchell published a Manual Of Bowls and this became the basis of the rules of the modern game.




Nailsworth Mills Bowling Club was founded in 1900 and is now based within the Nailsworth Mills Industrial Estate

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Avening Zip Wire Project

Following last years successful crowdfunder and several local grants (see 'backers' on project page, details below), we have now raised a fantastic £8,000. However, we have re-set our target to £10,500 to take account of actual prices and to purchase a steel zip wire instead of timber.






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
