Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



February is that quiet time of the year which I tend to think of as a kind of dormant period, allowing a brief time to ponder while awaiting the arrival of spring with all the busyness in the garden that comes with it. Snowdrops have arrived and the winter sunshine reminds us of better things to come. Very similar in some respects to the issues lining up to be dealt with and/or enjoyed over the coming year by the Parish Council and the village as a whole. We will have the Queen's Jubilee celebrations, the Centenary of the Avening Memorial Hall, the Village Fete and the 160th anniversary of the Parish School to name but a few, as life hopefully returns to pre-covid normality.

There are a few changes afoot; firstly, we have a change in personnel to our local Police. Our PCSO Sue Fellows departs for a more northern posting in the Cotswolds with our good wishes and thanks for her dedicated service over recent years. In her place we welcome PCSO Kimberley Collins. She has already become acquainted with Avening and we look forward to supporting her in her new role.

Staying with the 'policing theme' there is now a new innovative App available which aims to combat 'violence against women'. Titled 'Flare' it is a safe space to share the everyday experiences of women and girls. You can use the app to share your experiences of behaviours such as: drink spiking, verbal abuse, feeling unsafe in public spaces, being sent inappropriate images, sexual comments in public, inappropriate touching without consent, indecent exposure, stalking, harassment, staring, upskirting, etc etc. The app helps local agencies understand how and where you feel unsafe and take action. It's anonymous, quick, free to use and can connect you to support and advice in Gloucestershire. You can download it by visiting flareport.co.uk

Church Services

Working Together in Avening, Cherington, and the Benefice of Minchinhampton with Box and Amberley

Increasingly our churches are clubbing together in teams and wider benefices. The nature of benefices vary considerably within the Church of England, ranging from those who work closely together, to others which are an administrative necessity.

For the last four years Gerald South has been the House for Duty priest in charge of the parishes of Avening and Cherington. Now that Gerald has retired, the Diocese (and the parishes themselves) do not wish to appoint another House for Duty priest as a priest-in-charge as it is difficult to be a solitary priest with all of the responsibilities that come with this role. As both Avening and Cherington parishes adjoin the parish of Minchinhampton and both are less than three miles from Minchinhampton, conversations have been underway with the wardens of both parishes and the Archdeacons of Gloucester and Cheltenham exploring the possibility of combining these parishes and the Benefice of Minchinhampton with Box and Amberley.

The parishes of Amberley and Minchinhampton with Box were joined together as a benefice around twelve years ago and our benefice works on four levels:

- Ministerial support: We have a supportive group of active and retired clergy and a lay reader. This is invaluable as being a priest in a parish or benefice on one's own can be stressful and demanding.
- Administrative support: Having one administrator who is available four days a week is helpful as it reduces workload on the ministry team.
- Shared resources: We have run joint Lent courses, retreats, and borrowed equipment from each other.
- Joint services: Prior to the pandemic we had shared two services a year; Harvest evensong and Trinity Sunday evensong. It is hoped that this will resume in 2022.

Our conversations about working together have resulted in the following proposal:

A new House for Duty priest will be appointed to the parishes of Avening and Cherington. They will be an associate priest, and will report to the Rector of the Benefice of Minchinhampton with Box and Amberley, Howard Gilbert, who will be appointed as a priest in charge of Avening and Cherington. This new position will be an interim role for three years and the individual will be tasked with exploring what an enlarged benefice would look like and how it might work. The post may then be made permanent should we choose to continue with enlarging the benefice.

These proposals may well raise questions or concerns in people's minds. Please do speak to one of the wardens if you would like to talk more about this.



Down Memory Lane

Nick Winkfield's article about the lost village at Ledgemore certainly caught the imagination of a number of people. Gilian Bulmer Davison wrote to The Villager to say the following:

I was most interested to read Nick's article in the Villager magazine for February, as I too have heard old tales of Ledgemore. It was soon after I first came to Avening, and, if I remember correctly, I heard these tales from both Mr. Ross of Vale Farm, and Mrs. Lawry of Church Farm. Both accounts were more or less the same, so perhaps they are correct?

So here is my version......

There was indeed a hamlet of Ledgemore between Avening and Barton End. When the bubonic plague swept through, killing all the inhabitants, all the cottages were burnt and the ashes scattered in the valley, then covered with soil, so that no trace of it can be found today. Monks from Horsley Abbey had been tending the sick, and, fearing that the bodies were still infectious, they dug a large pit in the Bottom, into which all the bodies were placed. Inevitably they carried the disease back to Horsley and the bodies of the many people who died there were also carried down to be placed in the pit, as it was deemed to be a safe site, being a good distance from any other habitation.

When the Black Death finally died out, the remaining monks sealed the pit with layers

of soil, and the rain and streams soon filled it with water, creating the large pond which can be seen today, and known as Ledgemore Pond.

However that is not the end of the story! It is claimed that on moonlit nights a procession of hooded monks can be seen, carrying coffins on their shoulders, and lamps in their hands, silently wending their way down to Ledgemore Bottom from Horsley. Apparently, these had been seen by several different people, who all told the same story.

I used to walk along Ledgemore frequently, with a succession of various dogs - Chips, Shan, Paddy, Zac and Pippa - so know it well. As we approached the Pond I always felt a sombre and slightly forbidding aura hung over the place, and all the dogs, without exception, would slink away up the field, tails between legs, and give the pond a wide berth, refusing to come anywhere near it ! This was especially unusual, as the three labradors would normally have leapt joyfully in for a swim, and both Shan, a red setter, and Pippa, a lurcher, would have enjoyed a paddle and drink. But not there! Which makes me think that there is almost certainly some truth in these tales!

And Gilian wasn't the only one interested in the story. We were sent the following picture of the ruins of an old house, deep in the woods at Ledgemoor Bottom – though maybe a bit too modern to be the remnants of a plague village.

The Best Days of my Life

Teresa and Wendy (Jarman) were recently going through some things belong to their mother, Pearl Fletcher, and came across a notebook in which she had written down her memories of growing up in Avening and kindly sent them to us to publish. Pearl was born on 30th October 1935, she got married to Roy Jarman in 1954 when she was just 19 and passed away on the 3rd October 2013, aged 77.

The best days of my life that I can remember.

Looking back now that I have reached middle age, I have very fond memories of my childhood. Money was tight but it didn't seem to worry us too much, we always had lovely Christmas's due to our kind relatives. Uncle Eddie, my Mum's brother, and his wife, they always made sure we had presents, and Auntie Mabel, my father's sister, and her hubby was another and Mum and Dad would go without so we had things to open. We would hang pillow cases at the bottom of the bed, which I shared with my sister Rosemary, miraculously it always seemed Father Christmas came in the night and filled them up for us both.

Mum was a Nailsworth person (Bathe) before she married dad (Fletcher) at the age of 19 yrs 5 months, Dad being 5 years older. We had quite a few relatives in the Nailsworth, Avening and surrounding areas. When we visited Grampy Bathe, he always gave us a threepenny bit and we used to pop around the corner to buy an ice cream cornet, this was from Horsley Road, (now long gone). Uncle Eddie and Aunty Annie lived nearly opposite Grampy's and he would be the next port of call, he would sometimes give a piece of coconut as he always had one which he used to feed the blue tits, it

was quite a treat for us. He sometimes gave us three pence then we would go to the chip shop and treat ourselves to scrumpies (the pieces of batter that came off the fish as it was being fried), we thought we were it, having a bag of those to munch on!

Dad was quite fun when he was not working at night, he was a painter and decorator by trade and he was always in demand, so sometimes we didn't see a lot of him as someone or something wanted painting or wall papering done. He must have got very tired, but when he was home he used to give me rides on his back and pretend he was a horse, he used to let me think he was going to put me in the water butt by tipping me upside down over it, I used to scream as there were all wriggly things in it, and he used to laugh at me. Dad used to sing to us about a naughty little rabbit and he also gave me my first cigarette hoping it would make me poorly and not want to smoke; as I used to get his butt ends, it made me poorly alright.

Mum was always patient with my sister and I, she never smacked us, and I can never remember hearing her swear, she made most of our clothes and we always had new black patent leather shoes with an ankle strap, straw hats with flowers on, new dresses which mum had stayed up most of the night finishing them before chapel. Sunday school anniversary, Auntie Annie came to see us saving the pieces we had learnt and then get our presentation from the parson Smyth, which was a book, we then went home and sat down to a lovely tea.

Every Sunday after lunch Rosemary and I went to Sunday school chapel and when we came home there was our money on the table for our ice creams from Mr Lewis, the ice cream man, who used to come around with his bicycle and the cool box on the side, which made it look like a machine; it had three wheels and we always looked forward to seeing him.

We collected rags and bones for the war effort which we took to Lord and Lady Lea. His housekeeper Mrs Mortlock used to give us some Turkish Delight, which she had made, so we always liked going there, she was a lovely lady. At harvest time when we went gleaning, gathering the ears of wheat for Lord Lea, Mrs Mortlock would come up from the Old Quarries (Lord Lea's home), with a large basket of food and a drink for us, she was always a welcome sight to see, and we would enjoy the lovely food she had brought us in the shade of the tree.

Lord Lea was a lovely man, he and I used to have a chat many a time, when I used to see him I would call him Mr Lord Lea and he called me his little friend. Wording (*walking*?) was fun in those days, we would go into Gatcombe Wood, what a beautiful place it was to be, with the bluebells, primroses, wood anemones and wild strawberry's, large roman snails etc, we had many a happy hour in those woods. I always loved it up Steps Lane, in the summer there were always wild flowers, also orchids on the bank and when the grasses had grown very long, they used to move looking like waves in the sea when the wind blew through them. I always admired the beautiful view looking down to Gatcombe Woods and the Nailsworth Road, this was the best place in the world.

We would play galloping horses in the fields running about like wild things, and when the blackberries had ripened we would go round the hedgerows gathering them for Mum. We also gathered rose hips to take them to school, we get 3d [*pennies*] a pound for them, someone would come to the school and pick them up for Rosehip syrup This was our way to get a little money so we could buy something with as we never got any pocket money, even so we were happy enough.

Rosemary and I used to listen to children's hour on the wireless each weekday evening. We listened to Norman and Henry, Boy detectives, Larry the lamb, Ballet Shoes which I think was called The Red Shoes, Just William, Billy Bunter and Heidi. We loved that hour with the wireless, as we called it, I remember we had an accumulator which it ran on, but when we had the electric installed we had one that worked on that.

Cherington Lake and woods was another favourite spot. In February we would go there and it was like a wonderland as one part of the wood was covered in snowdrops, which we used to pick and take back to mother and in the streams leading to the lake we went water-cressing, it was lovely when we had that for tea but it made our fingers cold as the water was so cold at that time of the year.

Dad made us a big sledge and we used to go sledging with about 8 or 9 of us on it, that was the only time I really like the snow – we had winters then and long lovely summers.

In our garden at The Gables, Rectory lane, was a large apple tree which Dad hung a swing from it, many a happy time was spent on that. By the apple tree was a pig stye which we made into a little play house, we had a box for a table and some small chairs, we thought our little home was a palace and it was handy to the swing as well.

When the potatoes were ready we were allowed time off from school to go potato picking. I liked that as it meant no school for a while and a chance to earn some

money, which I saved to buy my parents and sister their Christmas presents. They were happy days with all the pickers singing the songs of the time we were in. I also love the smell of the new soil being turned over bringing the new potatoes out from it, combined with the smell of the tractor.

Looking back to my first years of school, we were very lucky at our village school, where Miss Chip and Miss Richins were our teachers. Miss Chip Debbie was more strict out of the two but they were both very good teachers, they taught us to read, write and we counted on an abacus, adding up and taking away, we used to write with chalk on a slate, there was a rocking horse and a big dolls house plus a swing which was brought down from the ceiling in the class room. I loved threading glass beads on a sort of long lace, also cutting shapes with rounded end scissors, the only thing I didn't like was drinking the milk, I hated that.

Most Christmas Dad's brother Uncle Frank and his wife Auntie Alice used to have a party with the rest of Dad's brothers, sisters and cousins etc. Uncle Frank would dress up as Santa Claus and come in with a sack over his shoulder, then everyone would sing, Uncle Frank had a few drinks and he would sing his solo piece, 'The Trouble with us Kids', we did not appreciate it at all and used to get fidgety, still it was very good of them to do a party. They used to have the shop on the corner, Auntie Alice had to be up early to get the newspapers sorted before they were delivered.

Auntie Annie lived down the street, she was very good with us, she had us most days for school dinner times, she would give us some homemade tarts and pies and lovely cups of tea, we used to chase her around a bit and she was always laughing with us. I was very fond of her and she certainly put up with something from me, she used to say she was going to adopt me she always wanted a daughter but had 4 sons instead. Uncle Alfred, who was her hubby, seemed quite a sober chap to me it's funny really but both Aunt Annies were small little ladies and both very good.

Unable to continue, end of the story.



Covid Walks that Activated my "Beady Eye"

I think that the first Covid "lock down" stunned a lot of people and I, along with many others, as the weather was so good took advantage of what we could actually do, which was to go for a walk.

I have to tell you that my walking is normally restricted to following a golf ball, or in days gone by walking to the pub, so initially this extended form of exercise came as a bit of a shock. However in the coming days and weeks I found myself walking tracks and paths that in some cases I had not been on for over 40 years and I was both amazed and sometimes saddened by what I saw.

Names and places have been omitted as I leave it up to you to work out some of the items that I am going to mention. On one such day we were walking along and we came upon what I thought was a house where I could never remember seeing one before. I asked how long has that house been there? The reply I got was that's a stable block.... No I said if that's the case it's the plushest one I have ever seen, what horse lives in there – Shergar? The reply I got was this is an example of buildings being erected with planning permission for a stable, shed and the such like, where some folk think they won't be spotted or objected to. Then after a short period of time, quietly a planning application goes in to turn it into a house or extension.

I have learned that just recently, as the Cilla Black catchphrase goes, "Surprise Surprise" the aforementioned stable is now being turned into a house.

Unfortunately as we walked around the neighbourhood I noticed more and more dwellings and buildings which seemed to follow this stable block criteria mentality. Word of warning as to any continuous form of this sneaky behaviour. Just like "BO-JO" your sins will eventually catch you out!

Onward with the travels and I noticed what a good job has been made of restoring and renovating the original black water pump points in the village and I just wonder as to how many residents know where, and how the water actually got fed to these outlets?

My education on the subject came from Nigel Stanton, a once staunch member of the Parish Council, who I met in the Cross one night and he said to me: "here, you're a bit of an engineer and I understand your Grandfather was a plumber, come and have a look at this." Laid out on the table were the original set of plans of the water system that he had just retrieved from some of the old storage boxes in the Parish Council Chamber Room. They were a delight to see drawn in colour with all sorts of artistic points of reference such as the storage tank locations that stored the water fed from springs, all set out at various heights and locations around the Parish, to keep the water pressure in the pumps up.

Basically, in order to keep the water pressure up there were three or maybe four tanks but I certainly know of three sited at various heights. One was up at the top of Steps Lane, one in The Park along West End, and another above Stephenson's corner of which the water can be seen near the road which is the overflow from the tank further up the bank. I can't remember who the engineers were (reference is mentioned on the drawings) but I can only admire what and how they achieved this magnificent feat of local engineering. It would be a good thing for the village to appreciate if these drawing are once again retrieved from storage and put on display for people to see – you don't have to be an engineer to appreciate how informative and artistic these drawings are and their part of the village heritage. As I understand the drawings have been relocated to Local Council Archives in Cirencester, so I would ask the Parish Council if efforts can be made to retrieve and display them, for instance during something like the Church Fete when lots of local residents are congregated.

Perhaps these observations both good and bad will provoke others into activating their "Beady Eyes". Locals should take note of all their surroundings and protect the local heritage that we have as there are individuals who take the view that they are entitled to do just what they like!!
