

Letter From Avening Parish Council Leader



Christmas will soon be upon us; unfortunately, unless the present rainfall eases it will either be a very wet one or one that is knee deep in snow! It also seems destined to be accompanied by industrial unrest in many aspects of our lives, in particular traveling by train. I can never reconcile the logic of strikes as they only damage reputations and disrupt innocent third parties – much better to engage in genuine negotiations to find solutions. Good news – I'm not aware of any planned industrial action within the village as everyone continues to work harmoniously together.

Remembrance Sunday – A truly inspiring occasion; the Church was full and the service was very moving. The event was ably supported by the Avening Silver band, and the presence of the Tetbury Royal Air Cadets elevated the occasion to the importance it merits. Following the Church service, wreaths were laid on behalf of the various village groups and societies as well as individuals with personal connections to the

Armed Forces and friends they have lost. It is sadly shocking to reflect on how many lives from small villages the size of Avening and Cherington were lost in times of war over the years. We all owe them an eternal gratitude for their sacrifices.

The Memorial Hall – Following immediately on from the Remembrance Service everyone was invited to the Memorial Hall for a gathering to celebrate the Hundredth Anniversary of the hall. The Parish Council funded drinks and food for the event. The food was prepared by the W.I. who came up trumps with a truly delightful array of food beautifully displayed. The W.I. members served tea and coffee and generally did a great job of ensuring that everyone was catered for. Additionally, the Tetbury Air Cadets were a great help with setting up tables and chairs and acting as extra 'waiters'. A big thank you to both Avening W.I. and the Cadets for their part in making it a really enjoyable event. Of course the food and drinks were only a part of the gathering – on display in the hall for the first time were a significant number of historical photos of Avening; which are now a permanent feature in the hall. These are photos from the archives which have been transferred onto canvas thereby making them safe to display as they do not need any glass protection. Our thanks go to Click Mitchell and her team of helpers whose hard work made this display possible in time for the event.

Villager of the Year – This annual award is normally presented at the village Church Fete, but with this year's cancellation, I was able to use the gathering in the Memorial Hall to make a public presentation. This year's Villager of the Year for 2022 is Jean Scotford. In

my opinion Jean represents the very best of qualities for this award. She has, over many years, taken it upon herself to 'keep the village tidy'; she has an appetite for gardening which has seen her cut back brambles and weeds which have been growing over various roads and lanes in addition to the car park in the Social Club, where she is a regular helper in the Tuesday Café. Jean goes about her efforts without any fuss or expectation. I know she is a 'good neighbour' to anyone she can help. Congratulations Jean – you deserve recognition for your contribution to our village way of life.

Playing Field – The exercise bars are now installed – so if you want to get fitter (or just make your arms longer!) then give it a go. New gates as previously promised will be in place very shortly. Subject to weather conditions they are scheduled for Friday 25th November so may be in place by the time you read this.

There are a number of trees to be felled due to Ash die-back – this is provisionally planned to start in January; so it may well be the case that certain areas will be sectioned off temporarily when the work is in progress.

Highways road signs and diversion signs, pot holes etc. – I would love to have a month where it's all good news about the roads! However, the same old issues keep coming up; signs that give insufficient information (I saw one in Bath the other day that said 'road ahead closed' and thought 'can that be referring to Avening'? – surely not!); potholes – still with us and the county have spent their budget for this year until April 2023. Keep on reporting them on the official website and something may get done.

Christmas – The Avening Christmas Tree lights will be switched on at 6.00pm on Saturday 3rd December, so please come along if you can. The location is as usual by the old telephone box at the top of the high street.

Posters – If you have put up posters please make an effort to remove them after the event *and* remove the staples – please help to keep the village looking loved and tidy.

Hedges – I have received a number of complaints about hedges that overhang footpaths – these can be dangerous if pedestrians have to walk in the road. Now's the right time of year to cut hedges back; it also makes sense to cut them back sufficiently that next year's growth will not be an obstruction.

Parish Council E-Mails – We have experienced difficulties with our incoming e-mails over recent months and are looking to find a new host in the new year. If you have sent any e-mails to the councillors and not received a reply, this may be because of the issues we have experienced. So please keep trying or call us if appropriate.

Last but not least; the restoration of the **Avening Village Sign**, which has graced the centre of the village for many years, is now complete and is back in situ in the school gardens. It has attracted a significant number of 'likes' on Facebook. Our grateful thanks go to George Buchanan for his time and skills in this project.

Finally, I would like to wish everyone in the village a Very Happy Christmas and Prosperous New Year from myself and all the Avening Parish Councillors



They will be taken down once they are out of date. Other posters may be removed and recycled once they are faded or to make space for others.

Appeal for the Restoration of Cherington Church Organ



Organ builders Harrison & Harrison Ltd (founded in 1861) from Durham, construct, restore, rebuild and maintain organs around the country including the “Cassons” pipe organ in St Nicholas Church, Cherington.

Starting organ building as a hobby, Thomas Casson founded then developed “The Positive Organ Company” in 1896. The organs were designed for small churches and chapels: some more simple, some with very decorative pipes and 2 manuals (keyboards).

Harrison & Harrison’s comprehensive report this Summer established that our organ, which has a single manual and 8 stops, was most likely completed in 1903. To rectify problems they

identified, mainly from damp and mice, their recommendations included repositioning the instrument further out from the north wall, and this involved dismantling and cleaning of all pipes, and the installation of a quieter blower.

The work as originally estimated has been completed ... however, there still remains work to be done on some unexpected elements where excessively rusted screws have to be removed for repairs on the leathering and the total cost of all the works runs into several thousands of pounds.

“It gives a good account of itself in the building ...” say Harrison & Harrison – and has indeed given many decades of great service.

Thankfully we still have the possibility of live organ music in our church not only for regular services but also for those important family occasions including Weddings, Christenings and Funerals. This is why it is so important to preserve the “Cassons” organ in as good repair as possible for the future.

We are starting fund-raising to help cover this work and we are inviting contributions from everyone who is interested in helping to maintain this important instrument which lies at the heart



of our church and its services and any level of contribution will be gratefully received.

Ring for the King!

Bell Ringers Needed for Avening Church



On Saturday 6th May 2023 the coronation of King Charles III will take place and church bells throughout the United Kingdom will ring out in celebration. Avening is very short of ringers, and we would like to recruit new ringers to train in time for next May. We are also very keen to attract people who have rung in the past to join our team.


For centuries church bells have sounded, calling people to services, in celebration of special occasions such as weddings, and in remembrance. Over the years we have rung the bells to mark royal marriages, the passing of Prince Philip and the late Queen, as well as for church services, local weddings and at New Year. Whilst we are the Avening team we also ring at Cherington whenever possible, as we did at this year's village show.

There are six bells at Avening church, the largest being the tenor bell which is twelve and three quarter cwt (648 kg). The oldest bells were originally cast in 1628 and there was a major restoration at the beginning of the millennium.

Like many British church bells our bells are hung in such a way that the timing of each note struck can be controlled by the bell ringer. A bell is like a child's swing,

How Bells are Rung


Bells are rung **full-circle** from the 'UP' position (upside-down) with a rope round a wheel. This allows ringers to vary ringing speed to change the order in which the bells ring.




Learn at your own pace in stages:

- 1. Bell handling**
↻ (pulling the rope)
- 2. Rounds** (ringing in time with others)
- 3. Change ringing** (methods) ↻

There are about 40,000 ringers in over 6,000 towers!

but with rigid fixings instead of two ropes or chains. By repeatedly pulling down on the bell rope in time with the bell's motion it can be made to swing up to 180 degrees either side of the hanging "down" position. When upside down it is termed as being "up" and can be held in this unstable balance position until the ringer wants it to swing again and strike a note. The note is produced by the clapper inside the bell striking the inner rim of the bell each time it swings.

Learning to ring a bell starts with being able to control the swinging bell by means of the bell rope. Even large bells can be controlled with little strength, there is no need to be strong, nor musical. Bell ringing is a great team activity that stimulates the brain and helps keep you fit, it also makes a glorious sound! I am biased, but I am sure most people enjoy listening to a well rung peal of bells. It is always fun to ring at weddings, we all ask each other who's the bride and what is her dress like, or who's the groom - do you know them? Years later you can say I rang at your wedding, or at your parent's wedding!

Avening is part of the Stroud Branch of Church Bell Ringers. There are many very skilled and experienced ringers in the area who are willing to come to Avening to help to train new ringers. We plan to hold a taster session on Tuesday 13 December starting at 7:30pm so anyone interested can come and have a go and find what it is all about. You do not need to be a church-goer to be a bell-ringer.

Concept Photography came in on the last day of October to take photos of the children and their siblings. They turned out really well and I know that some of them will be sent as beautiful Christmas presents.


The children also enjoyed another music session with Heather King last month. They had lots of fun bursting bubbles, playing instruments, dancing with scarves and playing with the parachute.

Avening School

It's Showtime!

The decorations have been dug out of storage and the stage is up ready to go for our Christmas productions. The children are busy rehearsing lines and the corridors are alive with the sound of singing as the performance dates draw near. The Eagles and Kestrels (yr. R, 1 & 2) will be performing ***The Landlord's Cat*** which tells the story of the nativity. Further up the school, our KS2 children will be delighting audiences with their performance of the Dickensian musical ***Olivia***.

When they are not rehearsing, the children have been busy with visits both in and out of the school. The Kestrels class enjoyed a spinning workshop to support their learning 'all about Avening' where they were able to experiment with a model handloom and ask questions using artefacts and pictures. Meanwhile, the Owls class visited Sir William Romney's school for an experience day where they took part in activities involving RE, Science and Music. Six pupils from the Owls class took part in an Earth and Space Day at Westonbirt School last month, where they participated in a selection of science workshops and enjoyed a space show in the planetarium.



Odd Socks Day saw the children and staff coming into school wearing odd socks during National Anti-Bullying Week to highlight the importance of celebrating 'difference'. Within their classes, all pupils did work to support their PSHE unit of 'valuing difference'.

Jim Hill – Bell Ringer



Many readers of The Villager will be familiar with Jim Hill who lives on Woodstock Lane. He can often be seen enjoying the good weather and chatting to passers-by from his front garden. Jim is a member of the Avening Silver Band and can also be seen conducting and playing at local events.

Behind the scenes and hidden away in the ringing chamber of Avening church he is also an active bell ringer, having been a member of the team ringing for church services for over 76 years, starting at the age of 14.

The photo here taken in 1953 in the Avening church ringing chamber is of bell ringers including Jim, who I immediately recognised. I'm sure some readers will recognise other members of the team in addition to Jim?

This month at the AGM of the Stroud Branch of Church Bell Ringers, Jim will be presented with the Branch Chairman's Rose Bowl by David Pouncey for his long service to ringing in Avening, and on Saturday 17th December at 10 am Stroud Branch members will ring a Quarter Peal at Avening Church in his honour. They will ring for about three quarters of an hour during which five bells must continuously change places following a predetermined "method".

Bell ringing is in Jim's blood. His grandfather George Edmunds was Tower Captain at Avening church for many years and rang and conducted a full peal at Avening in 1919. This consisted of each of the six ringers ringing 5,040 times to a "method" for about three hours without stopping.

Jim's recent ringing included ringing for the All Souls' Day service at Avening church when the bells were fully muffled as a delayed tribute to Queen Elizabeth II. Jim may have rung for the Queen's coronation, and we hope he can ring for the new Kings coronation on Saturday 6th May at Avening for which new ringers will need to be recruited and trained (see article on Page 16).

Shop wisely and avoid getting less than you bargained for!

With the holiday season fast approaching, Citizens Advice Stroud and Cotswold District has released top tips to remind bargain-hunters how to shop safely online.

1. Do your research: Before buying from a site you haven't used before, spend a few minutes checking it out. See what people have said about the person or company you're buying from by looking at reviews on different websites - don't rely on reviews the company has put on its own website. If you're worried that something you've seen online might be a scam, you can get help from the [Citizens Advice consumer helpline](https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/consumer/get-more-help/if-you-need-more-help-about-a-consumer-issue/) (<https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/consumer/get-more-help/if-you-need-more-help-about-a-consumer-issue/>).

2. Be wise to scams in disguise: If a bargain seems too good to be true, it probably is. If it's branded but a lot cheaper than it appears on the brand's website, it could be fake. It could be a legitimate 'look-a-like' product. Either way, it might not be the quality you were hoping for.

3. Ways to pay: Beware of a seller who asks you to pay by direct bank transfer. Bank transfers have limited protection if things go wrong, so avoid using them. You should only send and receive money through the online marketplace app or website using a debit or credit card, or via trusted methods of payment such as PayPal.

4. Know your rights: If you've bought from a retailer you might be entitled to a replacement product or a repair of your faulty goods. You can even claim a full refund if you can prove the goods are faulty. If you've bought from an individual, perhaps via an online marketplace, you have far fewer rights. In fact, you have no right to return, so long as the goods are 'as described'. Always be sure to take a screenshot of the description, and be sure to check and double check before you buy.

5. When things go wrong: Sometimes things just don't go to plan. If you've bought something that is broken, damaged, unsafe or not what you expected then contact the seller and give them a chance to put it right. If that doesn't work - reach out to the [Citizens Advice consumer helpline](https://www.citizensadvice.org.uk/consumer/get-more-help/if-you-need-more-help-about-a-consumer-issue/).

Anyone can be a victim of a scam, and even the savviest of shoppers can be left getting less than they bargained for. You shouldn't feel embarrassed if you're caught out. By knowing how to shop wisely, and what to do if something goes wrong, we can better protect ourselves and each other.

Orchard Update

All our new fruit trees survived the drought this year and while they are a few years off producing fruit they are looking well. We are honoured that the WI decided to plant their tree for the Queen's Green Canopy in the orchard. They chose a lovely Gloucestershire heritage variety of plum known as the Blasidon Red. Thank you to Helen Haiselden for organising and to Martin of the Gloucestershire Orchard's Trusts for supplying the tree and helping to plant it.

Over winter a few small patches of bare ground will appear in the orchard where the turf and topsoil will be lifted to create space to sow native wildflower seed. While the areas won't look that great over winter, we hope you will enjoy the flowers that will begin to appear from spring.

We are also purchasing a new strimmer just for the orchard which will enable us to manage it when and where needed. Our orchard management plan is designed to make sure we look after the trees while maximising the biodiversity value of this already wildlife-rich corner of the park.


LOCAL MAN APPEARS IN PART 3!

But this wasn't just play-acting in a good storyline - this was for real and persuading an RAF pilot to fly them so that they could parachute out of the plane behind enemy lines in the middle of a sandstorm with violent winds blowing does make you wonder how sane these guys were. Heroes indeed and it would be very difficult to blame David Stirling, credited as founder of the SAS, for getting severely drunk on many occasions.

But the final coup of the evening came as a huge surprise. There is one remaining member of that particular bunch of brave men who is still alive. He is Mike Sadler, brought up in the village of Sheepscombe not a million miles from Avening, and is aged 102. Through his friend Simon Haslam he wanted to send his best wishes for a successful evening and as you can see from the photograph that's exactly what he did. Who dares wins. Indeed.

The Subscription is now £1.00 per session, thanks to the generosity of the Parish Council.



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



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Avening Community Café

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Ian's Musings

Is "The Silly Season" Over Yet?

My father always had a saying that sticks in my mind; "the silly season" is here again, to which he referred to the start of the summer holidays through until about the end of September/October, when in his view everybody's heads were somewhere else, and if anything daft was going to happen, this was the period when it occurred.

Let's start with the Grand Prix of Star Lane and the surrounding lanes. I use these lanes frequently and I don't know where some drivers get the idea from that they are the only people on the road, go as fast as they like, thinking that the modern day "gismos" on their cars will save them. When they actually meet another car they seem to think that the other person has no right to be on the road, should move over into the hedgerow and let them speed past, then usually with a limp wristed wave, indicating that the oncoming vehicle should go back, make way, or just move over. Now I have to say that not all drivers exhibit this tendency but I'm afraid a lot do, and I am coming to the conclusion that its generally the influx of folk moving to the country who seem to think that the bully-boy tactics that exist in the towns and cities apply here.

Here's an example (and I am not going to give the sex of the driver.) I was travelling through Nagshead and there were 2 parked removal vans which I managed to just about squeeze past, then coming towards me at speed was a 4x4 vehicle which passed a pull in, stopped and with the weak-wristed wave indicated that I should reverse back past the removal vans that I had just managed to get through.

Realization eventually surfaced that they had to go back to the pull in, I then found out that even with all the "gismo's" on the car, reversing cameras etc. were not going to be of any use to this driver, as they could not go back in a straight line. It was like a sail boat tacking from side to side — then the inevitable happened and they backed into the wall. Now I was under perhaps, a misguided understanding that part of the driving test was that you had to be able to reverse and control a vehicle going backwards.

Let's move onto the cyclists, some of whom have the misunderstanding that the new powers given to them in the updated Highway Code mean that they are kings of the road and they have all the rights of way regardless.

Couple of examples for you to ponder. I was driving past the Woods Farm going down a slight decline with a slow left hand curve, then an upslope. Now I always travel slowly around that curve as experience has taught me that I am not usually alone on the road. Then around the corner comes the Peloton, 8 cyclists all across the road travelling at speed and talking to each other, I stopped, they couldn't, and 6 of them ended upside down in the hedgerow, the last 2 just about managed to stop. Luckily for them the only thing damaged, apart from a couple of bumps and scraps, was their pride.

Now for the “Nutter”. I have met this guy on two occasions, once head on, the other while I was travelling behind a tractor. His tactics are to pedal at a great rate of knots in the centre of the road fully expecting the oncoming traffic to get out of his way. Now bearing in mind that the width of the lanes varies between 2.5 and 3 metres and the width of my van is 2 metres including the overhang of the wing mirrors so there is not, without a pull in, a lot of room for passing or overtaking. He then starts quoting the highway code in very strong vocal terms that he should be given at least 0.5-1.0 metres of room for him to pass. Well this guy is in my view deranged at best and if he keeps up these tactics a suicide risk to himself.

The second event I witnessed was one day when following a tractor, then low and behold this guy came boring down the road straight at the tractor. His usual rant at the tractor driver ensued but unfortunately for him the driver had just about had enough, shut off the engine and was getting out of the cab to administer some common sense into this guy who realised he had pushed his luck once too far and beat a hasty retreat.

Now I have to say that most cyclists I meet are sensible people but there is a percentage who are pushing their luck, including the normal trick of riding deliberately two abreast so no one can pass in either direction.

Finally a word of warning to the parents dropping off their children at Avening Primary School at the bottom of the village. It is inevitable that before long there will be a major incident as parents are parking all over the road, children are diving out of cars, and on one occasion a parent was attempting to do a 3 point turn in between 2 lines of parked cars and children and in the face of the oncoming traffic instead of just going along to Woodstock and turning around. It will only take a foggy, wet or slippery day, a driver not paying enough attention that there will be an accident. So I would ask parents to be a bit more mindful of the potential risks that can, and unfortunately could come to pass.

So to answer my father’s question “Is the Silly Season” over yet.... I don’t think so!

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
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Letters to the Editors
