Avening and Cherington Churches



February often feels like a month suspended between seasons. Christmas is long past, spring still feels far off, and the world can seem grey and heavy. Yet in gardens, churchyards, and roadsides, small signs of change are already appearing: snowdrops, crocuses, and daffodil shoots quietly doing their work beneath the surface. Some first appeared in December; others are only just emerging.

These small green shoots remind us that hope does not always arrive loudly or all at once. Often, it begins almost unnoticed, growing slowly in the midst of ordinary days. Signs of emerging hope feel particularly fitting as I write this in January, in the aftermath of the devastating fires in Brimscombe and, just yesterday, Aston Down.

All of us have been touched by these events and their tragic consequences. Whether we knew the families personally or not, the news has rippled out through the local area. Yet even in the midst of deep grief and despair, I have seen signs of hope – green shoots emerging from frozen earth. These include the GoFundMe page raising £100,000 in a single day and, at the time of writing, standing at over £441,000; the many candles lit in Nu, Eve, and Ohner's memory at Holy Trinity; the crocheted flowers; and the charities and organisations working together to support those affected. These are signs of a community holding one another in care, and signs of hope we can hold on to in this time of grief.

In the church, February begins with the festival of Candlemas, when we remember Jesus' parents bringing him to the Temple to give thanks for his birth. It is a day when we celebrate the light of God's love shining in the face of a child. In the middle of winter's cold and gloom, Candlemas shines brightly, drawing us in just as the star once drew the magi to worship a newborn king.

Candlemas proclaims that hope is something we receive together. In the Temple, a tiny child is held by his parents, while two elders, Anna and Simeon, recognise in him the fulfilment of God's promise. The very young and the very old stand side by side, bound together by hope, gratitude, and faith.

As we light candles at Candlemas, we do not pretend that darkness has gone away. Instead, we affirm that light shines even within it – quietly, persistently, and often through one another. In this season, may we continue to notice the small signs of hope around us, and may we keep standing together, across generations, as bearers of light in a world that still longs for it.

District Councillor's Report



My January newsletter is back to the more usual format following the 'excitement' of the Local Plan in December – thanks to those that attended the public event in Tetbury, and I hope everyone took the opportunity to complete the consultation document.

Cotswold District Council (CDC): There was no full Council in December, and I'm away for the January meeting, but the **Overview and Scrutiny (O&S)** meeting was quite lively! The Service Performance report for Q2 (July-September) made reasonable reading, but I asked for an update on progress in the Planning Enforcement team and their progress on reducing the backlog of cases – this will come as a written update to me. The Financial Performance Report was also good overall, largely thanks to the prudent hand of our Chief Financial Officer.

We then reviewed the Waste Fleet Replacement Report – There is an established need to replace the 31 ageing dustbin lorries in the next couple of years, as they are increasingly unreliable and cause 'service failures' (missed collections) when they break down. I had hoped that a review of the service would have been undertaken in good time to feed into the report, or at least some discussions in readiness for **Local Government Reorganisation (LGR)** so that we would at least be aligned with our neighbours, but unfortunately the way our rubbish and recycling is collected was covered off in a couple of sentences and will remain the same for the foreseeable future – so we are stuck with the grubby white sacks for plastics and the completely unsuitable blue bags for ever increasing quantities of card!

The bigger debate was around how to reduce carbon emissions from the fleet. The Cotswolds isn't suited to the current level of technology around electric vehicles, so other than one 'test' EV for Cirencester the rest will be diesel. The solution was to start using biofuels or HVOs. These are made from waste oils such as chip fat but often include palm oil or other specially grown crops. The latter were not palatable to many of us on the committee due to the environmental impacts and the loss of agriculture for food. As a result, there were only two votes in favour of adopting the policy, but the Cabinet will ultimately decide on any actions, or audit of the fuels supplied.

Litter: Litter is prominent at this time of year due to the lack of foliage in the verges, so in Avening I organised a small and targeted litter pick along the Nailsworth Road to collect the accumulation of bottles, tins, and especially lighter fluid bottles which have become a big problem lately. We achieved 12 dustbin bags full in an hour!



Roads are obviously suffering through the winter, so please continue to report potholes via Fix My Street. I continue to work with the local Highways Management to highlight areas of particular concern.

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Letter from Chairman of Avening Parish Council



New Year already! Best wishes to everyone in the village for 2026. From the perspective of the Avening Parish Council we are looking forward to continuing to improve the assets of the village with the aim of continually working towards making Avening a village that is both pleasant and serves the needs of the community.

Proposed South Cotswold Local Plan: Councillor Tony Slater will be publishing his update in a forthcoming edition of The Villager on the latest available decisions that will have been made at Cotswold District Council level plus any influencing directives from National Government that may be forthcoming.

Local government Re-organization: As I mentioned in the December edition of The Villager, the final decision rests with the Government and should be announced sometime in the months towards the Summer.

Road Works and Temporary Traffic Lights: The traffic lights at Longford's Mill are now working as they should, after what has been a lengthy period of uncertainty as to whether or not they could be trusted.

Elsewhere around the village there have been an assortment of temporary traffic lights operating whilst work was being carried out on repairing gas mains, burst and leaking pipes and drains as well as the inevitable reoccurring spate of potholes. The use of temporary traffic lights, particularly those that were on a four- way system combined with their accompanying 'Road Ahead Closed' signs added much turmoil to pre-Christmas shopping trips.

I have had a recent meeting with representatives from Highways to discuss the very poor standard of the work that has been carried out. Some of the work was carried out just prior to the Christmas break; the priority of the various contractors seemed geared to 'getting it done and home early for Christmas'. The net result is that some of the work will have to be revisited. Personally, I think it demonstrates that if contractors are continually employed from outside of the county, then quality of work suffers and value for money is non-existent and the job becomes secondary to the whims of the contractors.

Public Parking: It has been a policy of the local police to turn a blind eye to vehicles parked in a untidy or obstructive manner, on the premise that Cotswold villages generally have older narrower streets which are not best suited to the size and numbers of modern cars. The police at this present time do not have a statutory responsibility to prosecute offending drivers. However, there is a proposal afoot to change the law and come into line with Northern Ireland and Scotland where such antisocial parking is an offence punishable by fines and/or penalty points on licences. This change in legislation could be introduced in the next few months, so please spread the word that parking on, or partially on, the pavements should be avoided, and acknowledge the safety needs of pedestrians, especially those with prams and children, and wheelchair users. Similarly,

please ensure that any over hanging hedges are cut back before the nesting season has started.

Memorial Hall: After nearly three years of negotiations, we are on the verge of signing a new lease with the Athelstan Trust for the school to continue the use of the hall and kitchens. This will be welcomed by all parties involved as a positive move to ensure the future of the school and its valued presence in the village community.

Playing Field: The Parish Council have placed orders for new benches and tables to be in place in time to enjoy the better weather when it arrives.

A reminder: Signs will soon be in place to alert users that surveillance cameras are in situ. The aim is to ensure the field is a safe, clean and respected village amenity.

We are also arranging a safety inspection of the trees in the field to avoid any foreseeable accidents.

Christmas Lights: My thanks to Geoff for his work in putting up the Christmas tree and lights. Despite the very windy weather it was a good to see so many families turn out to join in the switching on of the lights accompanied by the Avening Singers.

TONY’S CHARITY QUIZ NIGHTS

THE BELL, AVENING

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An Intrepid Journey

Ann Tarlton wrote to us, *Two friends of mine, Jeremy and Richard, took a converted Land Rover Discovery full of medical kit to Ukraine and here is their account of the journey.*

The illegal invasion of Ukraine by Russia is approaching its 4th anniversary and the conditions are worsening in the war zone for those defending their country, as well as for the civilians caught up in a war not of their making. International aid cannot be guaranteed and so it appears that the need to provide help is growing rather than shrinking.

Many of us feel sympathy for the Ukrainians and want to help them but it isn't easy to know where to start. Front line troops are very stretched and back up medical resources are insufficient as the situation deteriorates, over 1,000 medical facilities have been destroyed so far!

Richard Mullings and I decided to deliver his 'mature' 17 year old Land Rover Discovery full of medical kit and netting to Lviv in Ukraine in early October where the Discovery would be camouflaged and converted into a field ambulance for use on the front line. The Ukrainians need more vehicles and international support from volunteers now more than ever before. Richard and I are obviously paying ALL our own costs and donating the Discovery and its cargo but all help with donations towards buying drones and converting the Discovery etc is vital.

My wife did the same trip last year as part of a convoy of 5 vehicles under the umbrella of Driving Ukraine which has so far delivered over 300 vehicles to Lviv where they are converted for front line use. All the vehicles are camouflaged using both repainting and netting to disguise them from drones. Drone warfare being new to me, I was fascinated by the resilience and creativity of those involved in the defence of their country. We were not in a convoy but driving out as a single vehicle.

Richard and I drove 2,000 miles (via several vineyards in different countries!) before reaching the Slovakian/Ukrainian border. Our arrival there surprised the customs officer, police border guards and security boys as they had not seen Brits entering Ukraine with a full load of rather curious cargo. We did not have the relevant passes to hand and so our 14 boxes were unloaded, opened and inspected before reloading and crossing no man's land – before doing exactly the same to enter Ukraine. After 4 hours we succeeded in entering the country. Crossing the country on our way to Lviv took another 3 hours via 2 more armed checkpoints before climbing the Tatra mountains and brushing the Carpathians. A relatively underpopulated, beautiful and predominantly agricultural part of the world.

Google maps navigated us to our hotel which we reached around 9.30pm having checked in we went into the town for a late dinner. Returning to the hotel we had well over 3 hours sleep before the air raid siren went off sending us down to the air raid shelter in the basement. After an uneventful hour we returned to our rooms just in time for the next siren to go off. Being extremely tired I took the view that my bedclothes were probably bombproof and stayed where I was and went back to sleep! In the morning we



met our 22 year old coordinator who said that the previous week had seen a 3 hour bombing raid on Lviv with a lot of damage and some loss of life. We weren't quite as cavalier after that!

Pauli our coordinator is a student reading engineering so no real surprise that he designs, creates and

flies drones to defend his country! The town is rather surreal as shops and markets are open with civilians and soldiers going about their normal lives – but the damaged buildings are very obvious. We were shown one of several cemeteries with over 2,000 fresh graves, each one flying a national or regimental flag and covered with fresh flowers. All incredibly moving. Our guide was a recently discharged 50 year old invalided out of the front line. Equally moving were the churches where funerals of local soldiers were being held whilst we were there.

We asked for a suggestion for a restaurant that evening which was a great success! Shots of vodka on arrival, more at our table in the cellars of an old house and yet more sent over by a neighbouring table of Swedes. They had just delivered some ambulances and fire engines – as they had done regularly since 2022. We asked them to join us and after many bottles of everything and raucous laughter we became firm friends agreeing to meet somewhere, sometime in the future! Other countries near the Russian border take the potential threat very seriously and support Ukraine to show Putin that there is serious resistance to his empire building.

Luckily no sirens that night!

We handed over the Discovery in the morning and were driven to the Polish border which took only 3 hours to cross, then apart from a rather offhand luggage check we were safely in Poland. The following day we flew back from Krakow.

The Ukrainians we met were all delightful and very appreciative of what we were doing. Understandably they are feeling rather neglected due to Gaza being in the headlines. Their determination to resist the Russians is humbling. Their fighting ability and creativity is extraordinary, particularly their skill and understanding of drone warfare – they lead the world!

With continued support, particularly from Nato and Trump, they can certainly win. I would happily do it again.

All fingers crossed!

From Winter into Spring: The Quiet Work of Staying Connected

February often feels like a month on the move. Winter has not quite loosened its grip, yet the signs of spring are unmistakable. The light lingers a little longer in the afternoons, snowdrops and crocuses appear along lanes and in churchyards, and there is a subtle sense that the year is beginning to stretch and breathe again.

I have always thought of February as a time of transition rather than pause - a moment when we begin to look outward after the inward turn of winter. In the South Cotswolds, that shift is often reflected not in large events, but in the steady rhythm of everyday life returning. Walks become a little longer, conversations linger a little more, and familiar faces start to reappear after the quieter months.

Unlike December, with its Christmas lights and packed calendars, or the summer months of fetes and festivals, February rarely announces itself. Yet it is often during this less celebrated season that some of the most meaningful connections are made. Over the winter, and especially in recent weeks, I have been focusing on smaller, regular ways of staying in touch with people across the constituency - holding advice surgeries, visiting villages without a parish event in the diary, and spending time door-knocking in places that can easily be overlooked.



These moments are not headline-grabbing, but they are deeply rewarding. Conversations on doorsteps or in village halls tend to be thoughtful and grounded. People talk about everyday concerns, but also about what they value; their community, their surroundings, and the simple desire to feel heard and connected. Again and again, I am reminded that strong communities are built not only through big gatherings, but through consistency and presence.

This mirrors so much of what sustains village and town life more broadly. The volunteers who turn up week after week, the local groups that meet regularly rather than occasionally, and the neighbours who quietly keep an eye out for one another.

As the South Cotswolds weathers the long tail of winter, it is those small, thoughtful acts of connection that help our communities grow stronger and more resilient.

Five Valley Sounds – who are we?

We've been going for over 40 years and we've used reel-to-reel tapes, cassette tapes, CDs, now USB sticks and online. We are Five Valley Sounds – Stroud District's Talking Newspaper and we need you to talk about us.

Over two million people in the UK live with some sight loss; 320,000 are registered blind or partially sighted; nearly 80% of them are over 64 and every day 250 people start to lose their sight. There are also many people who cannot read print for other reasons such as after a stroke, dementia, aphasia. Talking Newspapers are a vital way for people to keep in touch with their local community.

Each week a team of Five Valley Sounds volunteers read and record a cross section of articles and notices from Stroud News & Journal. We add short stories and features of interest from different magazines too so our recordings last about 90 minutes. The recording is duplicated onto USB sticks which are then sent out, and returned, free of charge. We provide a free player to listen to the USB stick, and we show our listeners how to use it.

Listeners call us “a lifeline” and have said “if I didn't have your recordings about the local community, what would I talk about to visitors?”; “my mother was an avid reader of the SNJ before her eyesight failed – without Five Valley Sounds she'd feel isolated from the community” and “thanks very much for your stories, news, tales and cheery voices”.

Why do we want you to talk about us? Because we want more listeners, otherwise we're talking to ourselves. And of course the people we are trying to reach cannot read articles like these. If you would like to listen online it's <https://bit.ly/5VSListen>

We also welcome volunteers to join our team – to help record using our specialist software, duplicate the USB sticks or read for the recording. Full training is provided and you will only be volunteering every three to four weeks.
