Left to right: Coronation altarpiece created by the children at the Coronation service; one of the beautiful floral decorations in the church; the coronation celebration cake.





Chicks, Caterpillars and a Coronation



The whole school thoroughly enjoyed their celebration of the Coronation of King Charles III on Friday 5th May. Staff and pupils donned their smartest outfits for the day's activities, which a re-enactment of the included after which everyone Coronation. enjoyed a 'street party' in the lower playground where they were served cakes and sandwiches. Thank you to FOAS for providing us with the refreshments. Every child also went home with a Coronation coin, which

was provided by the school.

The natural world has come into our school this term, with the Eagles class (reception and Key Stage 1) all helping to care for ten chicks, which recently hatched in their classroom, enabling the children to learn all about life cycles. Following along a similar theme, the Kestrels and Owls classes will both receive a delivery of caterpillars in June which they will watch over as they develop into butterflies before releasing them into the great outdoors.

The Kestrels class will venture out of doors too after half term, to Copsegrove Farm where they will take part in den making and insect identification activities as well as some essential marshmallow toasting around the campfire. Learning about the natural world further afield, the Owls are off to the Living Rainforest as part of their geographical and scientific work on biomes.

The Owls have been challenged musically this term too. They are learning to play the flute and are discovering the effort that even getting a sound from this beautiful instrument can require!

As part of their transition to secondary school, the Year 6 children are benefitting from a wellbeing intervention provided for them by ArtsSpace. This involves them learning circus skills whilst having space to explore the many emotions that leaving primary school inevitably brings.

The annual whole school sports morning will take place in June with pupils competing in their houses to win the house cup and the sponsored walk will get us out and about in the local area before the end of this academic year.


The church bells at Cherington and Avening rang out on Saturday 6 May to mark the Coronation of King Charles and Queen Camilla.

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Avening Playgroup

The focus areas for the children over the past month have been:

Growing plants: The children have planted cress seeds in a carton that they decorated and taken them home once they had started to grow. They have also planted broad bean seeds with Shannon. These have been placed into sealable food bags with cotton wool and water, then stuck to the window. We are already seeing the roots and shoots in many of the seeds. We have all talked about what is needed to grow seeds and the life cycle of a plant. The children also enjoyed listening to and retelling the story of 'Jack and The Beanstalk' using pictures.



The King's Coronation: The children have been busy designing bookmarks and decorating crowns. We talked about Kings, Queens and castles, then on the Friday before the coronation we played party games

Shapes: We got the light box out and made pictures and models with the coloured 2D shapes. The children also persevered in cutting around six different shapes to then stick on to complete either a garden or space scene. They have been cutting different shapes out of the sparkly playdough and been doing lots of jigsaw puzzles.

Transport: We have been looking at different ways of travelling and the children have been colouring all sorts of vehicles. They have been playing with the boats in the water, making collages and models of different vehicles as well as playing a transport game. They have also been

rolling vehicles with different tyres in paint and





then rolling them onto paper to make lots of patterns.

We have changed the way we do snack time. We now offer a rolling snack time from 10am. The snack is laid out onto a table and the children choose when they want to have something to eat and drink. They wash their hands, pour their drink and help themselves to the food before sitting down at a table to eat it. Once they have finished, they are encouraged to put any waste into the food recycling bin and place their cups and plates into the washing up bowl. The children are always given a 5minute warning to let them know when snack time will finish to ensure they don't miss out. Congratulations to Rajvir for winning the "Tea for Two" raffle at The Kitchen. The ticket was drawn on Friday 12th by the children. Thank you to Sharon and friends for organising this.

District Councillor's Report



I am very proud to have been elected as your District Councillor, and humbled to have increased the number of votes. I look forward to working with officers and other councillors to achieve the best possible outcomes for the parishes and residents of Grumbold's Ash with Avening.

With the editor's blessing I will publish regular (brief) updates here on what's happening at Trinity Road. So far:

- I have been receiving my induction at CDC and getting to know my way around and meet senior officers.
- I have several parish council AGMs to attend around the ward villages, and I look forward to meeting all the Parish Councillors and clerks.
- I have been selected for the Overview and Scrutiny committee, an important role in holding the Cabinet to account and in contributing to policy development.

In Avening, I have continued to pursue the Environment Agency (EA) on two fronts to help identify the causes of our struggling stream. The retrospective planning application for an Impoundment Licence at Aston Farm has still not been resolved, due to information not being provided by the applicant – I pushed the EA for a decision and enforcement action if the data is not provided within a short timeframe. Following my escalation they have just advised me that they have requested an assessment of headwater flows in the stream across various states, including the drying up in the summer.

I have also been trying to establish if the rapid growth of housing in Tetbury has influenced the deep aquifer system that feeds our stream, and I finally made contact with the EA local groundwater expert. There isn't currently an accurate map of these important and interconnected systems, but there is a study underway using a series of deep boreholes and sensors between Cherington, Tetbury, and beyond Westend in Avening.

The bad news is that this report needs several years of data to be meaningful and isn't due to report its findings until some time in 2025! So, other than keeping pressure on the impoundment application, I'm afraid there isn't anything more that can be done until the report is published.

Things you need to know about Play Gloucestershire

Play Gloucestershire - a registered charity - is the leading provider of free, outdoor, active play in the county. Our Play Rangers activities target 7 - 14 year olds. Under 7's are welcome and should be accompanied by a parent or carer. We love families to join us at all our sessions.

Our Play Ranger activities are open access. This means there is no registration – children can leave the site at any time. Our Play Rangers will not stop them and may not know that they have left.

We encourage children to take responsibilities for their own actions. We think this is good for them. They will be encouraged to resolve disagreements amongst themselves. We will intervene if absolutely necessary.

Play Gloucestershire believe that children need and want to take risks when they play. Our Play Rangers aim to respond to these needs by offering children stimulating, challenging environments for exploring and developing their abilities. In doing this, we aim to manage the level of risk so that children are not exposed to unacceptable risks. Our experience tells us that whilst children play outdoors they are likely to have accidents. If this causes concern please come along and speak to us about it.

All our activities are outdoors and include den building, fires, arts and crafts, sports and a range of playful games. We encourage children to play freely and choose what they do. They do not have to do anything if they don't want to. Children will get wet, hot, cold, smelly and dirty and need to wear appropriate clothing and footwear. Better to wear old play clothes than ruin your best!

Our Play Rangers will provide drinking water at all sessions. We promote healthy eating and sometimes will provide free fruit.

We believe all children have the right to play. Please talk to us if your child needs additional support to enjoy Play Rangers. We welcome disabled children & their families.

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Christopher Viveash !938 — 2023

This tribute is delivered at his funeral on 17th February 2023 on behalf of the family with contributions from Vicki, John and Rod, together with Chris' friends John and Wendy Simmons.

Christopher Viveash was born on the 11th of December 1938, the first child of Irene and Oriel Viveash, at Longlevens Gloucester. His brother Roderick, who was born in 1944, mispronounced their names "Kitacker" and "Doderick" while he was learning to talk. The family nicknames Kit and Dod stuck particularly with his mother until her death in 1987, but were never used at school or work!

The family moved to Bourton on the Water in 1946 into a semi-detached house with a large garden. The many paths in the garden were used by the brothers on their scooters, hours of fun! 1947 saw the worst winter for many years with months of snow; the boys helped Dad clear the drive, Chris with the coal shovel and Rod with a wooden spoon, it was a long job.

Chris went to school at Bourton Junior and later Westwood's Grammar School, Northleach, and in his teenage years became interested in model plane construction. One such construction of balsa wood was left to glue on a table in the outhouse and much to Chris's anger was destroyed by Bouncer, the family's wire haired terrier; he later forgave the dog - after all it was his kennel!

When he left school in 1954, Chris joined the RAF, first at Halton near Aylesbury for training and then went to RAF Lyneham as an electrical engineer, mainly on Brittanias and Comets. He was later promoted to sergeant. He travelled to Borneo and Kenya, and for a year was stationed in RAF Gan, on an island in the south of the Maldives, which was used as a staging post for aircraft en route to east Asia, Singapore. Here he became the RAF base cinema projectionist.

He didn't go out drinking, but saved up his money and on his return in 1966 bought a car, a Morgan 4+4 and loved to give people lifts because few people had cars then and he would drive around Wiltshire countryside with his friends. Another pride and joy was his 3 litre Rover, again much appreciated by his friends.

His interests were now very much with motor bikes and cars. He worked on cars at home and, helped by Rod, he once removed an engine with block and tackle suspended from a branch of a large chestnut tree in the garden. He also gave motor bike lessons to novice riders.

He married Irene in 1969 and was pleased to see the arrival of four children – Vicky, Joanne, John and Alan - sadly Joanne died in infancy.

Vicki remembers going on the back of Dad's motorbike to his motorbike training school in Stroud. and he had a float for motorcycle training school in the Stroud carnival. She also recalls playing crazy golf with Chris at Holimarine Holiday Village in Burnham on Sea.

John appreciated Chris helping him build a Meccano car when young and helping with real cars when older. He says:

"I remember going in a kart with him at Flambards in Cornwall, I wanted to see how the kart handled, and he would encourage me. I remember I tried an emergency hard brake and steer and that put the kart up the bank at the side of the track and we had to be rescued!

"Vicky remembers pedal boats and later he would take us for bike rides after teaching us how to ride a bike on the playing fields in Avening.

"I could talk to him about anything because he was always so calm. He would tell me about his travels and that encouraged me to travel myself. I remember a story of when he went to Kenya with the RAF and he was tasked with transporting a brand new VW transporter van some distance across Kenya and it broke down! So he assessed what had happened and walked out to the nearest town to find a phone and tell them they needed to come out and what part they needed to bring!

"He would show me how things worked, and teach me things, taught me to be curious, I remember when I was young he gave me his multimeter and told me to touch the probes on things to see what would conduct electricity. Later in my life he had a book, '*Relativity for the Layman*' and he would teach me things from that book; nothing can travel faster than the speed of light!"

Chris worked for funeral directors and also in security at Kemble airfield. Sadly his later years were affected by ill health but his courageous, cheerful and uncomplaining manner is an example that many of us will remember and indeed be inspired by.

His friends describe him as calm and measured, and they never saw him lose his temper.



"April is the Cruellest Month......"

I've never been quite sure why T.S.Eliot should think of April in that way unless it had a special significance for him in "*The Waste Land*", which, I have to admit, I've not read, but I started to write this article on a particularly sunny, warm day towards the end of the so-called "cruellest month" and nothing could have been further from the truth.

I'm watching a nuthatch in my birdbath looking as though it's having the best bath it's ever had in the whole of its little life. Water spraying everywhere, including over a rather impatient-looking robin perched on a nearby shrub obviously waiting for the nuthatch to finish his ablutions and vacate the bath - if indeed there's any water left to bathe in.

Because it happens to be one of the few sunny days we've had, the garden is full of a lot of very busy wild life - birds heading off to their nests, quite a few large bumblebees and several butterflies checking out any of the shrubs that happened to be already in flower.

Nature at its best but, inevitably, there are the sad moments such as the other day when I heard the dreaded thump on a window which can only mean one thing. And it did. A female blackbird lying on the ground with a very obvious broken neck and no chance of recovery. I just hoped it wasn't on its way back to a nest full of babies awaiting the return of their mother

But, on the positive side - the other day I rescued a hedgehog. I noticed one of the dogs seemed to be particularly interested in something on the ground in the middle of the drive and, on closer inspection, it turned out to be a hedgehog curled up, as they do, in a tight ball. Needless to say dog got very speedily removed, I donned a pair of thick gardening gloves, filled a shallow bowl with water and took hedgehog and bowl to a safe place in the garden and carefully placed it alongside a large pile of dried leaves. When I went back about half an hour later I was delighted to see it had drunk the water and

established itself for the time being in its new, safe surroundings. So I felt that rescue operation had in a small way compensated for the loss of Mrs. Blackbird but that's what nature's all about. Joy and sadness.

The joyful moments when, at the end of a long dreary, grey winter you see the first snowdrops and aconites blooming in the garden and then you hear and see, as I did only the other day, the screeching of swallows announcing their arrival back for the summer. And, today, for the first time in two or three years, I heard the unmistakeable sound of the cuckoo.



Whatever human beings are doing to themselves and each other in the world, the birds will go on singing, the trees will come into leaf, the flowers will bloom, animals will run around our fields and woods.

Nature certainly does present us all with a wonderful tapestry.



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King William's Diary

King Charles has followed a tradition going back a thousand years by being crowned in Westminster Abbey. William the Conqueror was the first, on Christmas Day in 1066, just two months after defeating King Harold at the Battle of Hastings. It was his idea to ensure that the ceremony was so impressive that it left no-one in any doubt that he was the rightful King of England.

His wife Queen Matilda has had something of a bad press down the years, but an extract from his diary casts a more sympathetic light on the woman who ruled England for long periods on his behalf, and bore him ten children.

William was renowned as an excellent fighter and horseman, but not much of a scholar, so I've had to take some liberties in translating his diary.

Falaise, Normandy - 22 July 1082

This was always a somewhat boggy area but now all the water coming down stream is being soaked up in the ground; one reason where the water has gone, not so noticeable in the winter, but it'll be interesting to see what happens in the summer months.

I did, however, notice that some of the land owners of the woods going up into Cherington have had a bit of a bash at tidying up the trees - just as well, because some of them are absolutely rotten.

So please be aware of the local area we live in and take more notice of what is actually going on. Don't just sit back and say, it's got nothing to do with me. Wrong - it has!!



Ally Edwards, Longfield's Volunteer Services Advisor explained:




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Avening Parish Council

Planning

The Parish Council are extremely concerned that CDC planning take no heed of the opinions of Parish Councils in the district. Parish Councils go through the process of examining planning applications, speaking to residents to gauge opinions and concerns, only to have Parish Council views ignored. It was suggested that the Parish Council refuse to submit views in future but the council decided that, although it was frustrating, the Parish Council had a responsibility to the residents to persevere with the process and will continue to submit views in the hope that things change in the future.


