

Letter from Chairman of Avening Parish Council



Having been indisposed last month and unable to produce my usual monthly epistle, I was expecting to be able to cover lots of new and interesting items that have, or will be, occurring in Avening life. Unfortunately, it continues to be a quiet time of the year on many fronts.

While the rest of the world is in turmoil – with the war in Ukraine now exceeding 600 days, and the new conflict in Israel having the potential to engulf the region — it puts our own neighbourhood life in some perspective.

Let me start on a bright note: with a big thank you to everyone involved in making the Pig Face celebrations a great success, which has gone a long way to ensuring that this biennial event looks to have gained the support of the village for the years ahead. I would pick out for special mention Avening school and the participating pupils for their contribution; the WI for the catering; Michael Metcalf for carrying the 'Pig Face'; and a very special thank you to Roger Lindley who was the co-ordinator, script writer, and enthusiastic driver behind the revival of this Avening tradition.

There are always the repetitive items that need to be mentioned each month – pot holes, dog fouling in the Playing Field, parking congestion – please report the first one, clean up after your dog, and try to park as inoffensively as possible.

I have noticed that there is some damage in places on Lawrence Road which looks like damage from the heavy lorries coming to and from the new development. I will report this to Highways with a view to getting it repaired asap.

Memorial Hall: We are waiting on quotes from builders with a view to starting renovations to the toilets. The timing of the work, which will include reroofing, depends on the availability of the builders, availability of the materials at the right price and, inevitably, 'the weather'.

I must pass on our thanks to all the villagers who have hired the Hall in recent times for their diligence in leaving the venue in a tidy and clean condition. Thank you.


Planning: We still have the occasional planning permission granted by C.D.C. to which we strongly object. I just want to remind you all that the C.D.C. policy, introduced some 12 months or more ago, is to ignore local opinion; whereas a District Councillor sitting on the planning committee who could be from as far away as Moreton-in-Marsh, has the power to approve planning applications without ever having been to Avening. Democratic? – you can decide.

I nearly forgot to mention 'Road Diversion Signs'; something I find particularly irritating due to their lack of clarity in giving useful information, i.e. – just exactly how far ahead is the road closed? Recently on returning from Bath on the A46, there was a sign by the M4 junction saying 'Road Ahead Closed'. It transpired that the closure was some 8 miles further up the road (a fallen tree) and the signs remained in place for some considerable time after the road was cleared. It's becoming so tempting to carry a marker pen and

add some comments on the signs!

Lastly, a polite reminder that as the shorter days arrive and temperatures drop; please be alert for neighbours who may be vulnerable and need some help.

District Councillor's Report



At CDC: There are no formal meetings to report this month that I attended, but the Audit Committee revealed some worrying numbers – the £13.2m reserves the administration inherited in 2019 will be pretty much exhausted within 3 years if the current rate of expenditure continues. There will no doubt be some questions at the next full council.

We had the first session to look at the future of public toilets in the district, and we all agreed to survey those facilities closest to us – I have already visited Tetbury (two sites that are free to use), and Bibury. Luckily there were no other people around as I took photos!

£100,000 fund for improvement to village halls and community buildings: The Rural England Prosperity Fund is designed to improve rural productivity and connectivity. Much of the REPF funding is earmarked for grants to businesses, but over £100,000 can be used for improvement to village halls and community buildings, particularly to improve digital connectivity and energy efficiency. Applications are now being taken.

Also, **Rural Business Grant applications** are now open - the application process has just opened for the Rural Business Grant scheme, part of the Government's Rural England Prosperity Fund. The Fund is designed to help improve rural productivity and connectivity and help businesses in rural areas to diversify by introducing new products and facilities. Grants are for between £5,000-£50,000 and 50% match funding is required. Applications are open until 10th November.

Avening & Cherington: It was good to be able to attend the PC meeting again this month following the change in dates to the 2^{nd} Wednesday in the month. I was also able to take some updated photos of the team for the website. I'm hoping to persuade the Memorial Hall management committee to invest in their PA and projection systems to make them more user friendly – it would also help to reduce the number of times I am called out to assist. Following research among hall users it has been decided not to go ahead with the installation of a hearing loop system, as it is now somewhat redundant technology with few people able to utilise it.

I had a good, wide-ranging meeting with the Highways manager – we covered some dangerous blind spots in Avening; faulty traffic lights and VAS signs towards Nailsworth; inappropriate/incorrectly located slow signs close to Cherington Forge; and several long outstanding projects to improve drainage around the area. Some of these items can be quickly improved, but the projects are still being pushed into the future. Keep an eye on Facebook for the latest on Ash Dieback road closures in the area. I have also completed a damage claim against Highways for a split tyre while going about my councillor duties!



Avening Playgroup

The weather is turning and it is wonderful to be able to go out for walks, kicking up the leaves and searching for conkers. That's exactly what some of our families have been doing and they have brought all they have into playgroup for this week's theme – Autumn. The children have been using the leaves, fir cones, conkers and wooden branches to make dens for the different woodland animals. With the theme of autumn in mind, we have been looking at the changes in the trees, making owl collages cutting and painting paper plate hedgehogs, as well as dipping the conkers in paint and rolling them paper. The children have painted some cardboard so we can turn it into a tree and they have made colourful handprints to put on as leaves.



Over the last few weeks, we have also been looking at:

Ourselves – talking about how we feel and drawing ourselves. We also measured the children on our height chart.

Nursery Rhymes – lots of singing, sometimes with the musical instruments, and colouring in pictures of our favourite nursery rhymes and stories.



Cookery Corner

Quince and Cranberry Jelly

I am not a great gardener, and for many years I had not taken much notice of a shrub that climbed up a wall at the back of our house. I did notice that it had lovely bright red flowers in summer — and very sharp thorns, so I basically left it alone and it grew bigger. I then noticed it grew a slightly pearshaped, rather wrinkled-looking fruit, and with some help from Mr. Google, I discovered I had a quince tree growing in my garden. Apparently they have been know since antiquity and were once more common than the apple and were, in fact, often referred to as 'Golden Apples' by the Greeks. They are not great to eat raw, as they are hard and tart unless very



fully ripened, in autumn which they rarely manage in our climate.

There are, however, a number of interesting things you can make with quince, including the Spanish delicacy membrillo, or quince jelly, which is commonly eaten with hard Spanish cheeses. However, I prefer to make quince and cranberry jelly at this time of the year, as it is the perfect accompaniment for your Christmas turkey.

Ingredients

4 large quinces, roughly chopped450 gm cranberries (fresh or frozen)450 gm Bramley apples, roughly chopped1 kg granulated sugar

Method

1: Put the quinces, apples and cranberries in a large pan. Cover with water and bring to the boil, then turn down the heat and cook more gently for about 1 hr until the fruit is really soft.

2. Hang a jelly bag over a large mixing bowl, tip the fruit in and let it drip overnight – don't be tempted to squeeze the bag, or the pulp will come through and your jelly will be murky. (At this point I admit that I just use a large sieve and let it drip for a few hours — it seems to come out OK!)

3. The next day, measure the amount of juice you have and, for every 1 ml of liquid, use the same number of grams of the sugar (so for 500ml you'd need 500g sugar). Tip both into a preserving pan, or large pan, and bring slowly to the boil, stirring until the sugar dissolves. Increase the heat once the sugar has gone and boil until it reaches 110°C on a sugar thermometer.

4. Skim any scum off the surface of the liquid, then stir in the rosewater. Ladle into sterilised jars and cover with lids – or wax discs, cellophane and elastic bands.


